STOCK QUOTATIONS

Stock Markets At A Glance

WINNIPEG, Feb. 18 (CP) — United States interest purchased 500,000 bushels of oats Saturday on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange. Traders reported. Bulk of the business was for shipment from the Lakehead to the opening of navigation. No export business was reported in Canadian wheat. Rye futures moved irregularly in dull trading and at the close were 1/4 to 1/2 cent lower. May was quoted at \$1.30.

TORONTO, Feb. 18 (CP) — The Toronto Stock Market closed the week on a strong note Saturday, showing index gains for the western oils and golds. Western Oils led with a gain of 27. The two-medium-price Western Oils, Home and Calgary-Edmonton, changed hands in heavy volume at gains of 5 cents for Home and 15 for Calgary-Edmonton. They traded 6,000 to 8,000 shares each; minor gains appeared for some of the junior Alberta issues including British-Dominion, Anglo-Canadian and Foothills. Royalty was quite active and unchanged.

NEW YORK, Feb. 18 (AP) — The Stock Market Saturday stepped out of its best week since last June with buyers turning to assorted rails and industrial specialties while cashing profits in many recent climbers. The Associated Press 60-stock composite was up 1/4 of a point at 61.4, equalling Thursday's top mark since Sept. 4, 1937, and showed a net gain for the week of 1.7 points. Transfers approximated 700,000 shares compared with 510,000 the previous Saturday.

CHICAGO, Feb. 18 (AP) — Grains were lower in quiet futures markets Saturday but the selling pressure was not severe. Losses were confined to fractions. At the finish wheat was 1/4 to 1/2 cent lower, May \$1.62 1/2. Oats were 1/4 to 1/2 cent lower, May 66 3/4. Rye was off 1/4 to 1/2 cent, May \$1.19 1/2. Barley was 1/2 lower, May \$1.09 1/2.

MONTREAL, Feb. 18 (CP) — Prices of leaders exhibited marked strength in active trading last week on the Stock Exchange and Curb Market. All pivotal groups showed net gains in the averages, papers touching their best level since April, 1937. Volume was the greatest since July last year. Market students said a buying wave was motivated by the success of the Crimea conference in general. By the expectation that paper companies possibly have a favorable profit standard established soon by good earnings statements being issued by companies and, lastly, by a declaration of dividend on C.P.R. ordinary stock.

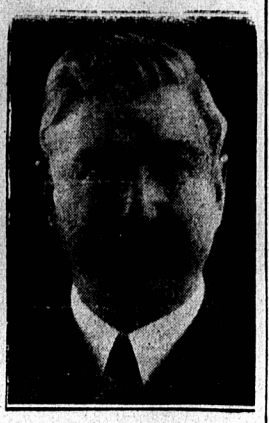

Maritime Trust Had a Good Year

The annual report of the Maritime Trust Company is of a satisfactory nature, as will be seen from the financial statement published in this issue. There has been an improvement in the Company's business position but the enactment of the tax authorities prevented better results. During the year the Company has increased the amount of its Estates, Trusts and Agency Accounts and Funds under Administration from \$3,584,897.10 to \$3,917,283.69. In the same period their Bond Trustships have increased from \$3,146,200 up to \$4,673,200. In compliance with the established policy of this institution, they have kept their investments, which are their working capital, in Dominion, Provincial and other high grade investments. As required by Act of the Dominion respecting Trust Companies, the Department of Insurance at Ottawa has made its annual inspection during the year. In addition to this a continuous audit has been conducted by the Company's own auditors. The Directors authorize the usual dividend of 3 per cent payable March 1, 1945 to shareholders of record January 1, 1945.

Mrs. James Conohan, was a business visitor to the city last week.

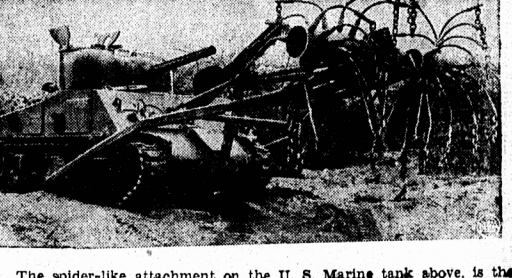
Pte. Ivan MacDonald who arrived home from war-torn Europe a short time ago severely wounded, has returned to the mainland to enter an army hospital for treatment.
