Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

This sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Lites—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his land. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of timber, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

HORSE SHOW ON THE BATTLE FRONT

Was Held by the Canadian Corps Amid Torrential Rain.

ANIMALS IN FINE CONDITION. A Battery Horse of the Original Division Received Wounds in Three Battles, But is Still in Good Condition.

CANADIAN HEADQUARTERS IN FRANCE, via London, June 19.—(By Stewart Lyon, special correspondent of the Canadian Press)—The Canadian Corps held its annual horse show today amid torrential rain. That did not matter, for there were no ladies, and there was no spring millinery and no grand stand. Under these conditions the horse came into his own as a centre of attraction. The transformation in the condition of the artillery and transport animals since March and early April, when serious losses were sustained because of the long-continued bad weather, is most remarkable. Sleek, finely groomed horses, their spirits restored by careful handling, pranced about as if they had never experienced the hardships of winter. Some of them have had three campaigns upon them.

A battery horse of the original division carries on his bow hand three narrow straps of gold braid such as the wounded men wear on their tunic sleeves as a badge of distinction. This horse was wounded in the flank, at Ypres in 1915, lost a rib at the Somme and was shot in the neck at Vimy. He is still in good condition, and doubtless spins great yarns to the recruits that are his stable companions. While judging between rival batteries is not so dangerous as umpiring a baseball match, it is perhaps as well that the judges are chosen from outside the corps. Their awards today were such as to encourage a lot of young fellows who never got prizes before to spend laborious days and nights keeping their horses and equipment in the pink of condition.

GERMAN PEACE TERMS.

STOCKHOLM—What may be considered the approximate German Government's peace terms was outlined here today, when the German majority Socialists gave out their programme for peace. The striking points of the plan were, no indemnity for Belgium, because "it would be difficult to determine which belligerents were responsible for damages on the various fronts, and a one-sided liability would merely mask an indemnity." Return of the German colonies, under the Socialist doctrine of "no annexations," retention by Germany of Alsace-Lorraine, "because they are nine-tenths German." The German Socialists outline likewise insists on complete political and military independence of all nations. Germany is to agree with her Austrian "comrades" regarding the future of Serbia and other Balkan nations. Poland and Finland's future is to be left to the determination of those provinces themselves; if independence is possible there, certainly they shall be autonomous.

Extend Sympathy.

To Greece, Ireland, Egypt, Korea, Tripoli, Morocco and Thibet the German Socialists extended "Greatest sympathy," and Socialists in those foreign lands. Of Alsace-Lorraine, the German statement declared "these are nine tenths German." They originally belonged to Germany and then to France. If they are returned to France now, it would be annexation." After the return of peace, the Germans would have "international arbitration and disarmament, except for defence measures, and for short enlistment for a police army." There should be "an international decision for all war-provoking disputes."

Listing their suggestions for future international laws, the German Socialists would require no exportation of munitions by neutrals, no prizes to be taken at sea, no merchantmen to be armed. All canals, straits and sea routes to be "internationalized." Food and clothing not to be held contraband. No censorship of letters between belligerents and neutrals. No trade war. Full freedom of the seas. No protective tariff. No secret diplomacy. In giving out their outline the German Socialists urged that the general Socialist conference declare it was not willing to discuss the responsibility for the present war unless the Entente delegates insisted on this.
