86 Corvettes Sold Commons Is Informed

OTTAWA, Nov. 14 (CP)—Eighty six corvettes which cost between \$20,000 and \$170,000 to build sold for prices ranging from \$10,000 for ships destined for scrap to \$30,000 for those disclosed today in information tabled in the Commons by Reconstruction Minister Howe.

- OTTAWA, Nov. 14 (CP)—Another 10-point reduction to an even 100 points was announced tonight by Defence Headquarters in the minimum point-score necessary for priority discharge from the Canadian Army. It was the second 10-point reduction since Nov. 1.
- OTTAWA, Nov. 14 (CP)—Fifteen government-owned pack steamship freighters, which cost between \$1,303,348 and \$1,100,000, were sold today for \$415,000 to \$360,000, Reconstruction Minister Howe disclosed today in the Commons.
- OTTAWA, Nov. 14 (CP)—William Andrew's firm, the International Nickel Co. Ltd., to employ women in its plants at Sudbury and Port Colborne, Ont., has been reclassified by order-in-council. Minister Mitchell announced today.
