THE SANTA MARIA
BACK TO CHICAGO

Chicago papers just to hand all give big prominence to the arrival there from Charlottetown of the Columbus caravel, Santa Maria. Interesting pictures are shown of the old ship and extended reports of her wanderings since leaving Chicago. The Chicago Post says:—

"The determining factor in bringing the boat back," said Mr. O'Shaughnessy, today, "was the personal interest taken by President Wilson. Upon being informed of the facts through Secretary Lansing, he took the matter up with the Canadian government, to insure its co-operation in our enterprise. That co-operation has been most hearty."

"President Wilson seems to feel as we Chicagoans do who have been battling throughout the years for the preservation of these valuable historical relics. They were a gift of Spain to us, and their preservation and proper display were dictated by international courtesy. Moreover, apart from their artistic and historic value, they have an educational value. Children who see these boats get a vivid introduction into the very beginnings of American history."

In the Santa Maria's hold is a new set of sails for both the Pinta and Nina. These sails were purchased from the proceeds of a moving picture of a Columbus pageant promoted by Mr. O'Shaughnessy, and were donated by him to the school children of America, for whom they are now held in trust.

Thus, when the Santa Maria gets back home, she and her sisters will be dressed in a new bib and tucker for the first time in five years and for the second time in a quarter of a century.

LONDON STORES CLOSE FOR WANT OF HELP

(Special to the Guardian)

LONDON, August 1.—For the first time in its history London will follow the custom of many provincial cities by closing many business premises for the first week in August. The shortage of labor and difficulty of arranging a supply of employes resulted in a large number of proprietors deciding to close down entirely from August 3rd to August 12th. Nearly 1,000 London stores in outer London will be affected. The majority of the business houses have notified their intention to close down from August 2d to August 7th.
