BUFFALO PROTEST THROWN OUT

League President Declares No Collusion In Syracuse-Cleveland Game.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) WINDSOR, Ont., March 19.—International Hockey League playoff game went ahead as scheduled tonight at Detroit and London, Charles S. King, the league president, said today in announcing he found there was no collusion in the league game at Syracuse Sunday night.

The game between Syracuse and Cleveland ended 13-7 in favor of the former team, the win assuring Syracuse of a place in the playoffs and Cleveland's seven goals enabled Falcons to enter the playoffs because they had scored more goals during the season than Buffalo, the team with which they were tied in points.

President King conferred today with Eddie Powers, manager of Syracuse, and Harry "Hap" Holmes, Cleveland manager, and after the meeting announced he was "perfectly satisfied" with the explanations given by the two men. "I found no evidence to lead to the belief there was collusion," he said.

Powers and Holmes in signed statements submitted to the President both said they and their players were prepared to sign affidavits the game was played according to the rules.

WILL WITHDRAW BUFFALO, N. Y., March 19.—Departure of Frank B. Baird Jr., wealthy young ice patron, from International Hockey League activities will be felt if for no other reason than his progressiveness.

The Montreal win was clinched by Bob Gracie, a former Bruin who registered a pair of unassisted goals in the last two periods. Marty Barry opened the scoring for Boston, with Max Kaminsky assisting and Gus Marker squared matters before the first period closed. Charlie Sands put Boston on top in the second but Cy Wentworth tied it again.

CUBS HAVE POWERFUL BALL TEAM

Outstanding Outfield, Capable Infield, and Fair Pitching Staff Led By Lon Warneke.

(By Brian Bell) (Associated Press Staff Writer) LOS ANGELES, March 19.—Chicago Cubs have a world of baseball ability but seem to lack, at the moment, the vital spark that makes champions.

The club clears the barrier for the 1935 National League race with four great outfielders, a capable infield, one of the best catchers in the game and a fair-to-middling pitching staff. If the all-powerful will to win is not inculcated, it may be just another season.

Lon Warneke, lean star in his middle 20's, is the class of the pitching staff and the club counts on help from two flingers procured by the trade route, Larry French, left-hander late of Pittsburgh, and Jim Carleton, righthanded veteran from St. Louis.

Charlie Root, another veteran, who contributed little to the success of the club in 1934, seems set for a far better year and Bill Lee, a big fellow with a season's experience behind him, should help mightily. The rest of the hurling corps will be selected from Clay Bryant, Tom Casey, Fabian Kowalik and Roy Joiner.

Gabby Hartnett, hard-hitting, clever catcher, will do most of the receiving with relief now and then from Ken O'Dea, tall youngster from Columbus.

Manager Charles Grimm has been playing at last game with his troubles of last year. At that, he will have a sub around in the person of Phil Cavaretta, young first baseman, to relieve him on occasion. Billy Herman at second, Bill BURGESS at short and Fred Lindstrom at third will complete the infield. Lindstrom was an outfielder with the Pirates last season and played both infield and outfield for the Giants before that but he seems definitely established at third for the Cubs. This picture does not include Captain Woody English, who may be fated to fill a utility slot, along with Stanley Hack.

Chuck Klein, Tub Steinback and Frank Demaree, hard hitters all, make up the outfield strength with Augie Galan, an infielder last year standing in reserve at least temporarily. The recall of Demaree from Los Angeles, where he led the hitters of the Pacific Coast League last season, has helped the club both offensively and defensively.

No names are being mentioned but there is a feeling around the camp that some slight tinkering may be done before the season is launched. Time will tell.
