BALTIMORE, Md., March 17 — (AP)—Kayak 2nd, C. S. Howard's Argentine-bred speedster, was rated a notch above Seabiscuit and Challeon in weights released today for the \$20,000-added Dixie Handicap, although he has been defeated by both of them.

Handcapper Charles J. McLennan assigned Kayak 2nd top weight of 134 pounds in the field of 51 horses nominated for the mile and three-sixteenths Dixie, to be run at Pimlico May 8, three days before the Preakness.

Seabiscuit, retired staminate of Kayak 2nd and turdum's all-time money-winner, was rated next in line with a burden of 132 pounds. W. L. Brant's Challeon, the 1939 three-year-old champion and "horse of the year," drew 130 pounds.

WILL BRITAIN STOP U. S. MAIL PLANES?

New Question Of International Law Arises As Clipper Planes Drop Bermuda Call.

WASHINGTON, March 18 — (AP) — Direct airmail flights which began this week to the Azores and thence to Europe, have raised a host of questions of international law — whether Great Britain will try to stop and search the clippers as they would merchant ships suspected of carrying goods destined for Germany, and if so, how it will be done.

During stops the clipper planes made at Bermuda, a large store of supplies and funds for Germany was found in the United States mails.

After crossing the Atlantic, the clippers stop at Lisbon, Portugal. There a portion of the mail is picked up by Ala Litoralia, an Italian liner and carried to Genoa, whence mail destined to Germany is sent to that country across northern Italy.

The question at issue is whether under international law a plane can be stopped in flight, forced to alight, and searched.

International law as recognized by the United States gives a warship the right to stop a vessel anywhere on the high seas if it is suspected of carrying the merchantman is carrying goods to Germany.

Such American legislation as to the neutrality act puts aircraft and merchantmen in the same category. The act says, "the term 'American vessel' means any vessel documented, owned, or chartered by a citizen of the United States."

It would seem therefore that the United States would recognize Britain's right to stop American planes. But some international law experts in Washington contest this. They drew up a draft convention last year which said that, unless they fly over belligerent territory or through a combat area, "certified neutral aircraft on scheduled flights are not subject to interruption by belligerents."

They claim it is impossible for a warplane to stop and search a passenger or mailplane in midair. They say in view of the impossibility of one aircraft's visiting and searching another aircraft in flight, if the certification system is to be used at all for aircraft, the belligerent must confine his inspection to land before and at the end of the flight.

This would mean visiting the clipper ships at Port Washington, Long Island, before they set out, or at the Azores or Lisbon.

Whether the United States and Portuguese governments would consent to this is not known.

Town Council Holds Adjourned Monthly Meeting

At an adjourned meeting of this town council held last night, a resolution was passed to increase the grant to the high school from \$10,000 to \$11,000 the resolution was passed after a standing vote had been taken.

Messrs. C. C. Dickie, and Alban Arsenault were appointed assessors and D. F. Archibald and W. W. Mutart auditors. There was a good deal of discussion on the number of appeals on the assessment of property. It was suggested that a committee on appeals should be appointed by the town council, the members to be made up of councillors with Messrs. E. H. Strong, K. C., included. Other were of the opinion that there should be an independent body of men to look into appeals.

Mayor Campbell felt that the matter was very difficult one, but that the citizens should realize that the council had to have money to finance the town, and if people were going to appeal on their assessment the only other way would be to raise the taxes. He felt that the assessors should be very careful in carrying out their duties as assessors. The matter was left in abeyance for the time being.

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
