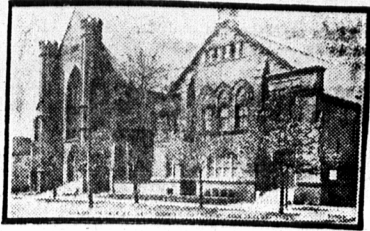

Increased Quantity Of Fish Landed

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, Aug. 20—Increase of 4,223,000 pounds in all fish landed in the eastern division, Department of Fisheries, as compared with July 1936 and a corresponding increase of \$2,550 in the value was noted in the monthly report of the division, released tonight. Nova Scotia had a decrease of 2,740,000 pounds but a slight increase of \$95 in its landed value. New Brunswick's catch was up 6,396,900 pounds and the returns to the fishermen were greater by \$29,267. Prince Edward Island showed an increase of 561,000 pounds with an increase in landed value of \$3,162.

Figures for each Province for July, 1937, with those for the same month last year in brackets: Nova Scotia: 32,423,300 (35,222,300); \$510,559 (\$493,354). New Brunswick: 18,386,000 (12,189,100); \$174,678 (\$146,011). Prince Edward Island: 4,034,200 (\$472,800) \$26,165 (\$23,003). Total: 56,569,900 (\$52,346,500); \$747,088 (\$724,738).

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

Weather conditions were favorable for fishing throughout the month and the total quantity of all fish landed was 561,400 lbs. greater with an increase in landed value of \$152. Most of the increase being due to heavier landings of hake and cusk which were reported very plentiful in North Kings. Cod were plentiful during the latter part of the month but owing to scarcity of bait in north Kings County and in Queens County the fishermen were greatly handicapped. The monthly catch however was slightly greater than that for last July. The mackerel catch was some 126,900 lbs. greater and the landed value \$2,330 greater. More clams were taken but landings of haddock and salmon decreased.

On Visit From Newfoundland

Visiting relatives and friends in the Province this week is Mr. H. J. Wyatt, prominent business man of St. John's, Newfoundland, formerly of Highfield. Accompanied by his daughter Jean, Mr. Wyatt motored from Sydney to Charlottetown and found the highways in excellent condition with the exception of a few miles on the mainland which are undergoing repair. He was particularly pleased with the Borden-Charlottetown highway. The trip from St. John's was made in remarkably short time. Leaving there Sunday morning at 10 o'clock, he arrived at Sydney at 8.45 the following morning, and was in Charlottetown at 1 o'clock on Tuesday. "I wish you would emphasize that," Mr. Wyatt said to the Guardian reporter, "many people here have the idea that it takes a week to get to Newfoundland. We even have inquiries as to how far we are from the North Pole!" Mr. Wyatt corroborates the reports of improved conditions in Newfoundland under Commission government. One thing badly needed, however, is a road improvement programme such as has been undertaken in the Maritime Provinces.

Leaving this Province fifty-five years ago as a youth of ten, Mr. Wyatt has since resided in St. John's. He is head of the Wyatt Coal and Salt Company Limited, a business in which he has been engaged for many years. His last visit to Prince Edward Island was five years ago. Exceptionally well posted on Prince Edward Island affairs, Mr. Wyatt explained there was nothing surprising about the I. E. He has been a steady Guardian subscriber for "years and years."

Senator Farris Heads Bar Assn.

BY FRANK FLAHERTY Canadian Press Staff Writer TORONTO, Aug. 20—(CP)—Vancouver will be the scene of the next annual meeting of the Canadian Bar Association and a Vancouver lawyer, Senator J. W. de B. Farris is the new president. It was decided at the final sessions of the Association's 22nd annual meeting here today.

Senator Farris was promoted from the post of Dominion Vice-President to take the place of the retiring president, Mr. Justice H. H. Davis of the Supreme Court of Canada. Other changes in the executive slate were the elevation of L. E. Beaulieu, K. C., of Montreal from Quebec Vice-President to Dominion Vice-President and the selection of Arthur Vallee, K. C., Montreal, as Quebec Vice-President.

The rest of the former officers, including the honorary executive secretary, E. H. Coleman, K. C., Ottawa, were re-elected. Mr. Coleman, Under-Secretary of State for Canada, is the only member who has attended every meeting of the association since its inception 22 years ago. Magistrate R. B. Graham of Winnipeg was the speaker at the final luncheon of the meeting and spoke of some humorous incidents in police court hearings and of the changes in modern life and their relations to the legal profession. Social conditions and customs had been greatly changed by modern methods of communication, he said, but the legal profession changed little. Lawyers were still controlled by the dead voice of decided cases.

N. S. Manager Boosts P.E.I. Fair

HALIFAX, Aug. 20—Attendance at the Prince Edward Island Exhibition was larger than he had anticipated, Secretary-Manager B. Frank Lordy of the Nova Scotia Big Fair said on his return to Halifax last night from Charlottetown. This was because apart from promoting Island industry the Garden of the Gulf fair was also serving as a first class tourist attraction. Mr. Lordy who spent two days visiting the Island exhibition paid tribute to what he said was the splendid work of the officials in charge. The whole program, including exhibits of all kinds, amusements, midway and race attractions, was outstanding, he declared.

The Nova Scotia fair manager was impressed by the large number of tourists present, many of them from the United States, and this he said had increased the advertising value of the Garden of the Gulf exhibition. Because the Island fair was held at the peak of the tourist season attendance had been further increased and the Island was provided with a first class attraction which lured many visitors during ideal summer weather. Beyond admitting he would like to try out earlier dates for the Nova Scotia Exhibition which will be held this year, September 27 to October 2, Mr. Lordy was reticent to speak when he was asked directly if he favored an earlier opening for the exhibition in this province. The dates, he said were fixed by the exhibition commission. In Prince Edward Island, however, August had been found an ideal month to hold the exhibition, he said, and this selection had met with universal approval from both fair patrons and exhibitors. The Halifax fair manager stated he had been greatly impressed by the splendid display of fireworks at the exhibition.

U.S. Sailor Killed, 18 Wounded

SHANGHAI, Aug. 20—One United States sailor was killed and 18 wounded tonight when an anti-aircraft shell of undetermined origin struck the after well deck of the United States Asiatic Fleet. The Augusta, flagship of Admiral Harry Yamell, has been lying in the Whangpoo river a little downstream from the heart of the international settlement, covering the evacuation of refugees from stricken Shanghai. The shell plunged from a high angle. Both Japanese and Chinese artillery and anti-aircraft batteries had been firing furiously through the late afternoon and into the night.

Giants Halt Phils With 21-hit Attack

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Aug. 20—New York Giants delivered their heaviest dose of pitchers' poison to the faltering Phils today and cubbed out a 13-6 victory. They collected 21 hits for their biggest hitting and run-making production of the season, and remained right on the heels of the Chicago Cubs in the National League fight. The heat got Giants' star right-hander, Clyde Castleman, in the third and forced him to leave the game. In the sixth, relief pitcher Dick Coffman collided with the Phils' Herschel Martin in a play at first base and was spiked so badly on the right foot he had to be carried to the clubhouse. Billy Terry sent Carl Hubbell into the game to finish up.

BEE STING DODGERS Boston Bees made every hit count and nosed out the Dodgers 6-5 in Brooklyn behind the effective pitching of Danny MacFadden. Although out hit 12-9, Boston bunched two hits each in the third and fourth, and three in the fifth, for a total of five runs off Max Butcher, and then put the game on ice with one run in the seventh. Cy Blanton won his 12th game as Pirates rallied behind his six-hit pitching to defeat St. Louis 7-4 in Pittsburgh. Pirates bunched five hits for four runs in their half of the third, then won the game in the fourth with two runs.

Mr. Gordon K. Daley secretary of the Dalhousie Reunion Committee, presided at a meeting yesterday morning for the formation of a provisional committee to undertake organization of a Dalhousie University Alumni Society here on the Island, there being over 200 ex-students now residing here. Company Fails To Open Hochelaga Mill (C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Aug. 20—Union leaders of nearly 10,000 idle textile workers acclaimed tonight as showing the "solidity of our ranks" failure of Dominion Textile Company to resume operations in its Montreal Hochelaga mill. While smoke belched from chimneys of three Montreal units, less than 30 workers walked through the gates of the Hochelaga plant, thrown open early in the afternoon. Company officials admitted it was impossible to begin work with the small returning forces. Earlier in the day, an estimated 600 of the 3,000 Montreal workers who answered the strike call of National Catholic Federation of Textile Workers Aug. 2, entered the west-end plants reopened yesterday. Union demands are headed by request for a collective labor agreement. G. Blair Gordon, managing director of the company whose chain of nine plants spreads through six Quebec cities and towns, declared "the mills are producing." Gordon said about 100 workers joined those who went back yesterday. The Hochelaga mill was reopened quietly under protection of 50 police, who sent about 600 strikers into the streets before the gates were opened. Six pickets were allowed to remain outside the plant. The strikers gathered on a side street two blocks from the plant, and for a time exchanged good natured repartee with police. Two tomatoes, aimed at the police, were thrown from the strikers' ranks, but missed. Rain finally drove them to their homes. Gordon, predicting all four plants

Lewis Threatens To Bolt From Democrats

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) WASHINGTON, Aug. 20—John L. Lewis virtually threatened today to bolt from the Democrats and swing his Committee for Industrial Organization forces into a third party movement to solve "pressing social problems." Angered by the fate of the wage and hours standards bill, which has been blocked by a hostile House of Representatives rule committee, the Labor leader came nearer than ever to an open break with the party which his union forces backed with ballots and money in last year's campaign. Without mentioning President Roosevelt specifically, Lewis declared the "Democratic leadership" has been shown to be "unable to carry out the pledges made in the name of their party during the 1936 campaign." The leadership, he insisted, must restore "party discipline" and permit "government to function" or "confess that their party is not the vehicle by which the people of the country may progress to a solution of their pressing social problems." Lewis, strongly worded state- ment recalled the C. I. O. chief- tain and his lieutenants have also been dissatisfied for weeks with President Roosevelt's course during recent strikes. They contended especially the President should have stepped into the recent steel strike. A "passive resistance" campaign last night by southern Democrats, who buried the Lewi-backed wage and hour bill deeper than ever in a congressional pigeonhole, stung Lewis into making his statement today. Lewis said the committee would be at normal early next week, said the company was receiving an ever-increasing number of messages from employees wishing to return.
