Serious Schism Will Be Result Of Church Union

Dr. H. W. Dickie Addresses Open Letter to Presbyterian Moderator

UNION HALL UNFAIR Demands Reconsideration of Question of An Honorable Discussion

Scoring the Church Union Bill as an unfair instrument, and abhorrent and obnoxious to those who wish to remain Presbyterians, Dr. R. W. Dickie, pastor of Knox Cross Church has addressed an open letter to Dr. Alfred Gandier, Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Dr. Dickie declares that the Presbyterian Church in Canada is threatened with a schism of serious proportions, amounting to hundreds of congregations and scores of thousands of Presbyterian communicants. He urges that the question of Union should be referred back to the churches, or that the Moderator reorganize the parties in the church and arrange an honorable division and separation.

UNHAPPY STRIFE Following is the text of the letter addressed to Dr. Gandier:

"Knowing your deep interest in all that pertains to the welfare of the Church of God and particularly of the Presbyterian communion in Canada, I venture to address you as our chief presbyter in the hope that you may be able either to find a way of ending our unhappy strife or to bring about a reconciliation between the Church Union or to devise a means by which a just and honorable division may be secured. In this approaching year I am keenly conscious that I am unable to consider myself bound by the action of the last General Assembly, believing as I do that it was

ultravires. May I take this opportunity to assure you that only the most conscientious convictions, as they come to mind, are the basis of my opposition to the deliverance of a body I regard so highly and whose approbation I ever court. But with all due deference to the chief court of our communion and after having patiently listened to the reasons given for proceeding with the union, and administrative union with the Methodists and Congregationalists, I am still of the opinion that such a step would not be to the advancement of the Church of God in our nation; rather, I am convinced, as a small group of those in opposition to a choice between Union and the wilderness, it puts us into a new communion against our judgment. It destroys the constitution of our Presbyterian Church for no other reason than that we should not be bound by the action of a body which we do not wish to remain Presbyterian. We do not wish to be contentious, we much dislike contending with our brethren before courts and parliaments, but we believe it our duty to remain Presbyterian, and

neither should they wish to prevent us from adhering to Presbyterian standards and traditions. "But, venerable Moderator, we who wish to remain Presbyterian cannot bring ourselves to think of the Church Union Bill that is being promoted before Parliament as anything other than a most unfair instrument of Union. It is most obnoxious and abhorrent to us. It has, in our eyes, every mark of an heroic measure to compel Union for our whole communion when free and intelligent discussion failed to do so. It aims at preventing a schism by redress of those in opposition to a choice between Union and the wilderness, it puts us into a new communion against our judgment. It destroys the constitution of our Presbyterian Church for no other reason than that we should not be bound by the action of a body which we do not wish to remain Presbyterian. We do not wish to be contentious, we much dislike contending with our brethren before courts and parliaments, but we believe it our duty to remain Presbyterian, and

in the presence of such a Bill our Unionist brethren need not be surprised if we stand on our rights in law. We do not know any reason why our brethren in their haste to join with the Methodists and Congregationalists should so override us, who are still of the same communion, or why they should put such pressure upon us to carry us with them into Union. If Union is to be, I beseech you to do your utmost to secure a fair and decent Bill, one which recognizes those in opposition as Christ brethren, which shows some semblance of an appreciation of the principle of religious liberty, and which gives some cretain evidence of wishing to treat fairly those in opposition. Given a fair Bill, both parties could unite in its support before Parliament. Such a Bill would recognize that there were two parties in our communion, one going into the Union Church, and the other going to remain Presbyterian and give all Presbyterians an equal opportunity of freely declaring to which they wish to adhere."

EXPLANATION MADE OF FRENCH CREDITS TO LITTLE ENTENTE PARIS, Jan. 26.—With unfounded debts to the American and British governments amounting to nearly \$5,000,000,000, some criticism has been directed at France for having advanced \$500,000,000 francs to countries of the Little Entente during 1923. Of the amount, 400,000,000 francs were credited to Poland; 200,000,000 to Yugoslavia and 100,000,000 to Rumania. However, documents published recently by the French government show that not one centime has left the Bank of France consigned to those countries. The figures merely represent credits opened by the French Ministry of Finance to the various countries, against which they have drawn for the payment of supplies, mostly war materials, purchased in France. Not has the French government disbursed any money to the manufacturers of the materials. The amounts due the manufacturers have been deducted from war and other taxes due the French government, and in cases where the amounts due the manufacturers were large than the indebtedness to the government, the

balance was made up in government bonds. On the other hand, it is pointed out that France has been the largest exporter of material to the countries of the Little Entente, the French government thus having found a way to dispose of its war material in course of production during the last months of the war and which the signing of the armistice made unnecessary for the French armies. Previous to granting this credit to Poland the latter's debt to France was 1,056,000,000 francs, mostly for war material.
