Text of German Reparation Bill

LONDON, March 14.—The text of the German reparations Bill providing for fifty per cent levy on the purchase price of imported German goods to be applied to reparations which was formally introduced in the House of Commons yesterday.

The bill describes the German goods to which the Act shall be applied, as "goods first consigned from Germany to the United Kingdom, and goods not so consigned being goods wholly manufactured or produced in Germany, or goods partly so manufactured, or produced where less than 25 per cent. of the value thereof is attributable to manufacture or production in any countries outside Germany."

The Act, however, will not apply to goods imported for exportation after transit through the United Kingdom, or by way of transshipment.

The bill provides that the importer of German goods shall be liable for such proportion of the value of the goods not exceeding fifty per cent as the treasury may see fit to carry them out.

Prince Edward Theatre Uproarious Comedy And Big New Serial

Better Gas Masks Made By America

WASHINGTON, March 14.—Gas experts in the naval bureau of ordnance have perfected a gas mask that marks a big advance over the clumsy contrivances that were used during the war. Details of the invention made public today reveal that in addition to being designed for use in the open—an anticipation of gas bomb attacks against battleships—the new safeguard also may be used by submarine crews. Carbon monoxide gas, which forms so easily in submarines, always has been one of the greatest sources of danger that the navy has had to risk in its underwater tests.

The new mask serves as adequate protection. Tests conducted by the Navy Department have proven that with the aid of this mask it is possible for men to effect repairs on a disabled submarine that in other days would have been impossibilities and when left alone would have resulted in the death of the entire crew.

The new navy mask embodies, of course, many of the ideas which war experience gave this country. The use of a mouth piece which hampered breathing and prevented the wearer from using his mouth for any purposes but to clutch the bit has been eliminated. The chemical tank has been removed from the chest or under the arms as it was carried during the war and has been placed back of the user's head. The feed pipes lead from the back into the face of the mask through two openings just above the eyes.

Dairy Course

The Dairy Course in connection with the Provincial Agricultural School will open today. There is a splendid equipment for a practical course in cheese and butter making, milk and cream testing and different branches of dairying. Messrs Pippy and Cooke of the Dominion Department will have charge of the testing. Mr. Bird and Mr. McKay of Nova Scotia are here to direct the butter course. Mr. Barry, chief of the Dairy Division, Ottawa will be here to discuss the production of dairy produce with the butter and cheese makers. The butter makers arrived yesterday to start their course and when this is concluded the cheese makers will take up their course. Prizes of \$55 in cash and a goat watch will be distributed among the makers of September cheese exhibited at the Provincial Fair last year.

Wilson Plans To Continue Fight For The League

WASHINGTON, March 14.—Woodrow Wilson does not intend to set himself up as a carping critic of the new administration but he can be counted on to continue his fight for the League of Nations and the international policies he firmly believes will triumph. At opportune times, the former president will be heard from in a manner designed to retain at least a measure of the political force he once wielded.

One of the reasons Mr. Wilson consented to form a law partnership with Bainbridge Colby, it was learned was to keep actively in touch with affairs. As the result of the vast improvement in his health, which has taken place in the last four months, he will not consent to be counted out of part in the public affairs, no matter how unofficial his activities may be.

Mind Still Bright.

The very nature of Mr. Wilson's ailment, one which leaves him in virtual possession of his keen mental faculties, but denies him physical activity, contributes to his desire to keep a hold on affairs. Unable to occupy his time with diversions that a well man could find, he is planning to fill his days with more than mere literary effort. To members of the Woodrow Wilson Club of Harvard who visited the white house a week ago Mr. Wilson announced that he proposed to spend his remaining days in the fight for world peace.

Since he became a private citizen it is understood, Mr. Wilson has received hundreds of telegrams and communications from various sections of the country from advocates of the League of Nations urging him to continue his fight to make the United States a part of the world scheme he helped to formulate at Paris.

American Cash For Sinn Feiners

DUBLIN, March 14.—After assuring General Strickland, commanding in the Cork area that they would not distribute any money in the martial law area without his consent, the American Relief Commission, it is charged immediately handed \$3,000 to the Sinn Fein White Cross Society in Cork. They then proceeded to take a trip around Queenstown Harbor with the local Sinn Fein officials. This sort of thing coming on top of their failure to call together the advisory committee they told Sir Nevill MacReady they would summon and their apparent complete surrender to the Sinn Fein White Cross Society has greatly strengthened the belief here that the whole affair is just an ingenious Irish-American scheme for getting money into the coffers of the Irish Republican Army and making trouble between Great Britain and the United States.

Sir Nevill MacReady and General Strickland are both entirely in sympathy with any scheme for relieving Irish distress, but are strongly opposed to the promiscuous paying into Sinn Fein hands of money that is bound to relieve if not actually to swell the Irish Republican funds.

ARROSTOOK JUNCTION, March 14.—Word was received here today of a double tragedy which occurred on Saturday in the East Limestone road, just over the Victoria county border in Arrostook county and not far from the village of Four Falls. James Emerson, a farmer, well known on both sides of the international boundary line, shot and killed his wife, Victoria, at the home of her son, Cecil Flannery, and then shot himself, passing away later. Emerson was about fifty-eight years of age and his wife ten years younger. The tragedy is supposed to have been due to domestic differences.
