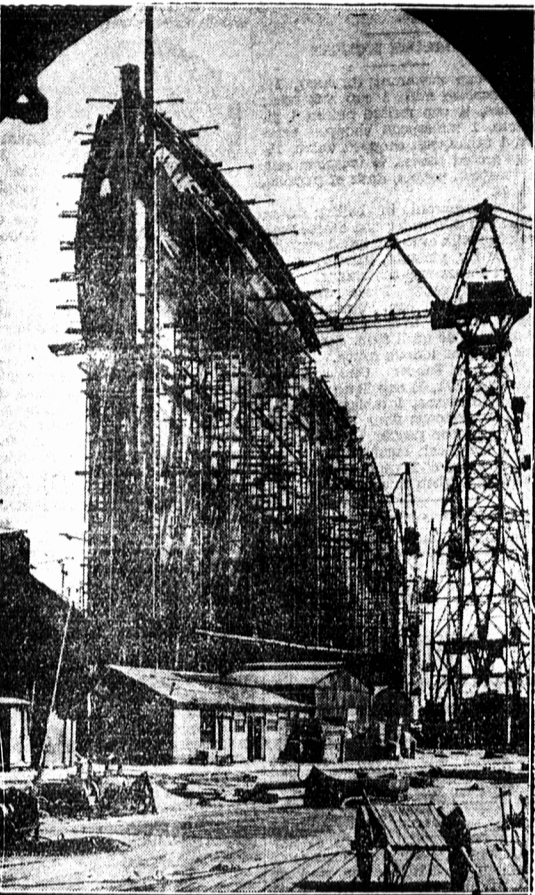
## Big Increase In Canada's Revenue

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, July 4.—A notable increase in customs, excise and income tax revenue in the month of June was announced today by Honorable R. C. Matthews, Minister of National Revenue. Customs collections were \$5,456,108, an increase of \$1,227,881 over June 1933. Excise taxes totalled \$9,878,867 and excise duties \$3,688,088. Increases of \$2,706,178 and \$280,757 respectively. Total customs and excise revenue for June was \$20,990,277, an increase of \$4,224,349 over June 1933. Income tax collections in June were \$2,474,268, a gain of \$364,074.

## MACMILLANS MUST PAY COSTS OF CASE

### Justice Ives Dismisses Suit Brought By Edmonton Stenographer Against Alberta Premier.
