HITCH IN MARITIME PREMIERS PROGRAM

Premier Parent of Quebec Opposed and Will Have Nothing to Do With Our Representation Grievances.

MONTREAL, Sept. 22.—There appears to be a hitch in the conference arranged to take place when the Canadian provincial premiers were in London with respect to the anticipated reduction of the representation of the maritime provinces in the House of Commons on a count of the showing of these provinces in the last census. A meeting was arranged to take place in Quebec early next month, but so far no steps have been taken to call it together. It is reported that the reason is found in the coldness of Premier Parent of Quebec. He refuses to have anything to do with the proposal to ask the British Parliament to amend the British North America Act. Therefore it is stated that a new plan of operations has been adopted. All the Maritime province representatives will refuse to vote for any redistribution bill which proposes to make any reduction in the membership from these provinces. If persevered in, this policy will be apt to make things rather uncomfortable for the Laurier government.
