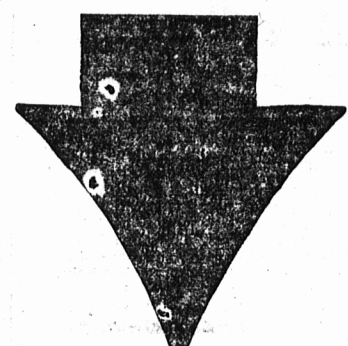

Sergeant William McNeill "A" Company of Fairview. Corporal Norman Macdonald "A" Company of Rice Point. Corporal Malcolm McLeod "E" Company, Bradalbane. There are still starting in market service men of the Island Company who will report here for duty in the course of a few days. It is hoped that many more of the 82nd Regiment men will follow the good example set by these non-commissioned officers. The men of the 82nd Regiment have responded well, but many more of them are wanted at once to serve their King and Country.

**SOLDIER RETURNS.**—Lieut. Ray Sellar, son of Mr. William Sellar who formerly conducted the Morell House in Charlottetown, arrived in Charlottetown Tuesday night, all the way from the battle front in France. He was accompanied by Mrs. Sellar who met him in Quebec, she having proceeded thither from her home in Winnipeg. They proceeded at once to York where Lieut. Sellar's father is now living. It is eight or nine years since Lieut. Sellar left Charlottetown. He enlisted in Winnipeg with the 11th Battalion, First Contingent, and in England was drafted with the Princess Patricia's Regiment to Belgium being shifted later to France was given two months leave of absence, because of sickness, he having been laid up with rheumatism as well as having suffered from the effects of gas at Ypres. He will be on the island for only three days and then proceeds to Sydney en route to Winnipeg where he has been living before enlisting.
