MODERN TENDENCIES.

To keep pace with the times is the desire of the average human being. In business, in politics, in social life, real success is the reward of diligence in investigation and insight into the trend of things.

Curiosity is not limited to one nationality nor to one particular class of people. That which is unusual will draw a crowd. Rich and poor of every nationality and age will congregate in an effort to learn something, to grasp a new idea, to satisfy the craving for information. An idea who first solves the apparent mystery is hailed as a leader.

This impulse, called curiosity for lack of a better word, we recognize as a great factor both in the discovery of new ideas and in their dissemination. The rash experiment of Benjamin Franklin with his kite is an immortal example of what curiosity may instigate. The ripening idea shows, among other things, the telephone, and telegraph which though in a remarkable state of development, are but forerunners of the world electrical now in progress of creation.

So well known are the advantages of innumerable electrical devices that their mention has ceased to stir curiosity. These have become permanent factors. The cartoon of the next page concerns but one of a series of devices especially noteworthy, not only because of their efficiency and economy, but because of their efficacy in applying heat to the right place—a very important feature at a time of year when the thermometer registers an insufferable temperature. The electric flat-iron, the electric chafing dish, the electric toaster and the electric percolator are equally well known. The novelty of their use is quickly superseded by the realization of their necessity, not because of their apparent ornamental nature, but because of their effectiveness and cleanliness. Matthew Arnold wrote in his essays, "The pursuit of perfection is the pursuit of sweetness and light," little dreaming of the possibility of our realizing his ideal in so short a time by the wide-spread use of the electric fan and the electric

light.  
The disciples of Arnold's teaching are constantly working, and what is more, the result of their labor is ample food for the inquisitive. The electric kitchen invites your consideration and inspection more seriously to-day than ever before. Your ideas of electrical cooking may find realization in either of two ways: the electric kitchen range, requiring no new outlay of cooking utensils, but displacing the more primitive heating devices; or, on the other hand, the electric kettle, the electric broiler, in short, single independent electric devices having the heating apparatus in themselves. In the last named arrangements you require no range in the kitchen. A paradox you say!  
The electric heating devices have come to stay. Their reliability and quickness, their spotlessness and individuality have made many friends. Are you following the trend of things? If so, you know that it is electrical.—Electrical Mag.

WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY WITHOUT SPARKS.

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—A Paris cable says:—The *Matin* announces that a system of wireless telegraphy without sparks has been invented by a young French engineer, Julien Bethnod, one of the favorite pupils of the late Henry Poincare, and a personal friend of the wireless pioneer. By Bethnod's invention it is said to be possible to establish wireless stations in close proximity to one another without the messages being confused, and that it is also possible to exchange communications ten times faster than by submarine cables and ten times less expensively. Mr. Bethnod's wireless sparkless system necessitated not a plant only an alternator and an antennae of a special character.

The primary advantage of the system is that sounds sent direct from the machine in the antennae will not be interfered by other posts on the same zone. Moreover, thanks to automatic system of perforated bands, two stations will be able to exchange their messages at a maximum speed of 200 words a minute. Other advantages of Bethnod's system are greater simplicity of installation and cheapness, each wireless station being capable of doing the work of ten cables; yet costing hardly more than \$200,000. Bethnod's discovery also makes wireless telephone still more possible with a spark, only 2,000 oscillations per second can be reduced, while the human voice can go 20,000 vibrations. By sparkless wireless telephone, 20,000 oscillations per second can be produced.

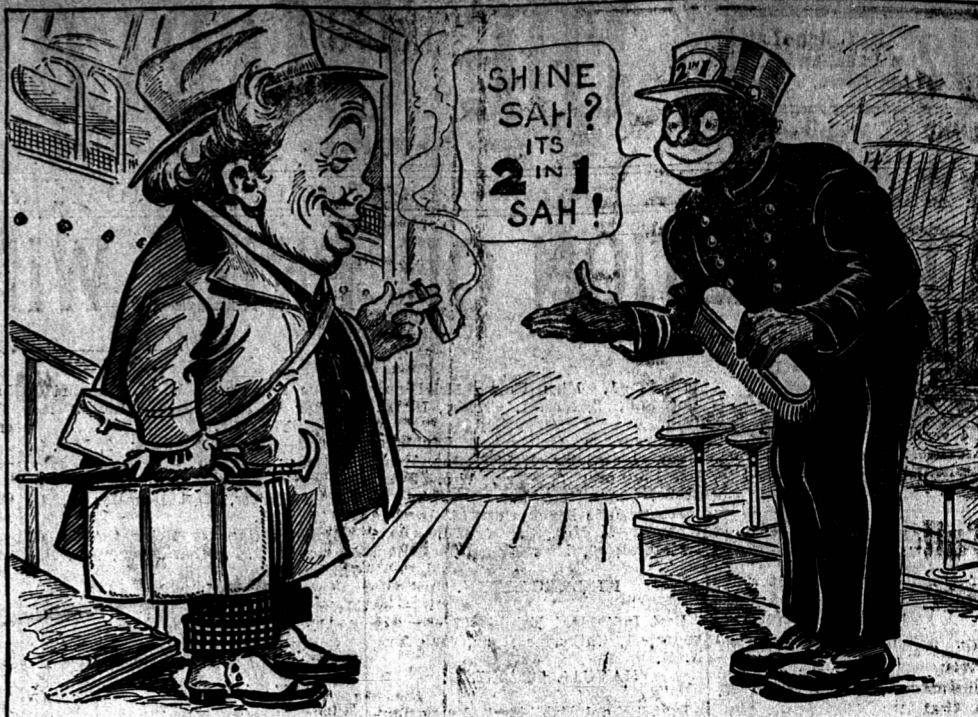

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, a resident of any section of a valuable Dominion land in Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must apply on certain conditions by letter, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.  
Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.  
In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$20 per acre.  
Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required for a homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres.  
A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$20 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$500.
