He, accordingly, admitted the accused to bail to stand his trial at the next November term of the Supreme Court. The prosecution withdrew the charge against Lemuel and Jessie Coughlin in the four cases A. C. Saunders acted for the prosecution and Neil McQuarrie K. C. for the defendant.
-THE PASSING OF BRYAN.
The Democratic party seems determined to dump Bryan in the ditch before the battle begins next year. His own State party has rejected him the party in Congress pointedly rejected his advice on the wool tariff and, lastly, that same party roundly cheered Mr. Underwood, the House leader of the Democrats, when he scored Mr. Bryan for making an unfounded attack on him touching the iron schedules.
The marvel is not that the Democracy should be making special effort to be sure that they will not have the Nebraska to reckon with next year; but that he should have retained his power so long. His ascendancy in his party ever since 1896—with on short interregnum while the innocuous Judge Parker went down to defeat—is the most remarkable example of personal prowess ever shown in American politics. It is comparative ease for a man to keep the leadership of his party, when he is leading them to successive victories; and yet in American politics, the successful leader is not usually allowed to wield the baton very long.
Grover Cleveland was a successful Democratic success since the war—and yet he led his party for certainly not more than ten years. His power was broken while he was still President; and the first combination of Bryan was a vote of censure on him by his own party. General Grant—with all the prestige of a successful war record—failed to get a third nomination from his party. No other man since Washington has ever been in a position to aspire to one. Yet William Jennings Bryan has actually carried his party's standard on three occasions; and it is now thought necessary to make a special effort to see that he does not either get it again or dictate the name of the man who does.
Looked at in any way, it is a marvellous achievement. It indicates two things very plainly—the great personal ability of the man, and the fact that he has spoken for a very powerful feeling in the United States. He came before the country as the voice of discontent; and as such he has been listened to with very considerable attention for a decade and a half. Just what would have been his position today had not the dramatic personality of Roosevelt, preaching the same doctrine, intervened, it would be difficult to say. Roosevelt to a very considerable extent did the work of Bryan. He took up his policies and put many of them into effect, thus at once allaying discontent and robbing the Democratic party of its position as the sole mouth-piece of that feeling.
