Dominion Live Stock Report
MONTREAL, July 20.—Live
stock for sale on the two markets
today amounted to 43 cattle, 161
lambs, 401 hogs, and 289 calves.
Trading was steady and most of
the stock was sold early.
There was no good cattle and common
bulls sold from \$3.50 to \$4.25, com-
mon cows were \$3.50 to \$4. A
couple of lots fairly good calves
were sold for \$8.50 and others \$8
and \$8.25. Grass calves \$4.75 to
\$5. The ruling price for lambs
was \$15 per cwt, although a few
poor ones were sold for \$14.50.
There was a strong demand for
hogs and most lots were sold for
\$11.50. Sows brought \$11 and
better, with a few light trim sows
up to \$12.
