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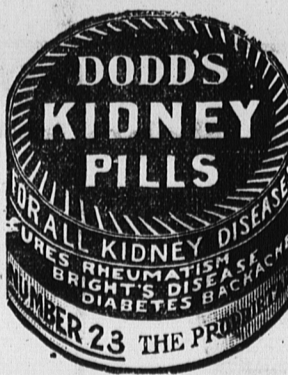

IMPROVED ARTIFICIAL ARM FOR SOLDIERS

M. H. C. Limb Factory Turning Out Arms With Both Hook and Hand Attachments

Mr. B. Bowler, foreman of the limb factory of the Military Hospitals Commission at Toronto, where all returned soldiers are fitted with artificial limbs, is not ashamed to improve upon nature in the matter of man's equipment. As a result the young Canadian who loses an arm in France will have the member replaced upon his return with an arm fitted with two hands, one built for looks and the other for speed.

The controversy over hands and hooks on artificial arms has thus been settled, and the result is being found very satisfactory. Due to Mr. Bowler's ingenuity in fitting out the week-day substitute for five digits and a grip with a double steel hook which grips by means of a steel clamp, and is very easily adjusted. It has a knuckle joint adjustment, and is removable at the wrist where for evening wear, Sunday, and "occasions" the artificial hand it attached.

Successful in Workshop

The first man to wear one of these arms is Pte. Munn, a gardener, and he finds that he can manage any of his garden tools quite comfortably with his new hook arrangement. The appliance was tried out with scores of mechanical tools in the workshops and found satisfactory as well.

The hospital authorities find that this device settles a big problem for them, which the pull between a man's pride of looking well and his necessity of earning a living presented. The hook was by far the most useful, but they rebelled against its appearance at home and on the street.

Further Improvement Probable

The government limb factory has the right to avail itself of any patent device in limb manufacture, and ever greater improvement may be made with constant experiment going on. The returned boys will profit by it all, for the Commission assures them that their artificial members will always be kept in repair and suitable for their needs.

NEW AUTO LOCK HAS ALARM AS AN ADDED FEATURE

A thick triangular block, to which a strong U-shaped metal member is attached, constitutes a new type of automobile lock. To prevent a car the U-shaped part is clasped about the tire and rim of a front wheel, and then the two parts are snapped together like a padlock. A key unlocks it, but if it tampered with, a gong begins to ring. The lock is shown in use in the October number of Popular Mechanics Magazine.

FAKE WIRES FLOOD DISCHARGE DEPOT

Home Folks "Dying" To See The Men Attempt To Cut Red Tape Entanglements

"Home casualties" keep the wires hot and the messenger boys on the run when the transports land at the eastern ports with their loads of discarded warriors, returned to Canada unfit for further service.

The homecoming boys might be a plague descending upon Canada judging the effect upon the health and longevity of their relatives. Telegrams pour in from every section of the Dominion to the Discharge Depots of the Military Hospitals Commission, urging that John be sent home at once. His mother is dying; his father is dead; his wife and children have been evicted from their home; he has just become the proud father of twins—no misfortune in the whole category of calamities has been overlooked in the endeavour to free John quickly from the red tape of discharge and restore him to his

Picking the trumped up messages from those based upon fact in the business of the O. C. and staff, and deciding how dead a man's father is after 75 out of a hundred messages have proven fake is a test for any man's intuition.

"These boys have had pretty tough luck overseas, in some cases," declared Lt. Col. Marriott, O. C. of the Quebec Discharge Depot, "but it's nothing in comparison to the line up of troubles that greet them when they land in Canada if you want to judge by the telegrams we receive."

"They are anxious to get home and their people are just as anxious to have them, and the nearer they get the harder it seems to wait. In many cases we have found that the boys have sent telegrams asking their relatives to wire for them.

Get Benefit of Doubt

"In many cases they have put it over on us, but we catch most of them. In case of death you can't be too sure even though there is a lot of dramatic talent loose in the place, for you'd rather be on the safe side and fooled, than hold a man up to the regular routine and find out too late that the wire was authentic."

"We try to get the fellows off with all the dispatch we can muster. Not a man is held over a day longer than is necessary and once they have been here a day or so they realize that, but when they first land, all they want is to go home, and every man thinks that he is the first one who ever thought of wiring for himself."

SALMON-DRESSING MACHINE WORKS AT HIGH SPEED

In ten hours' time the latest model of a machine, illustrated in the October Popular Mechanics Magazine, intended for use in fish canneries, is able to clean and dress approximately 36,000 salmon. In operation it is entirely automatic, and without special adjustment handles fish weighing from two to 20 lb. Because of its speed, it is able to do the work of about 60 expert laborers, and thus is an important economic factor in a cannery. As salmon are carried upward and around a large wheel, they come in contact with knives and revolving devices that remove the heads, tails, fins, and entrails. The

**HEAD-ON TRAIN COLLISION AT END OF SIGNAL BLOCK**

A recent head-on collision of two freight trains has few parallels in railway history in that it occurred at the point where two block signals were located to mark the division between two blocks on a track which was used for trains traveling in opposite directions. The two trains, as shown in the October number of Popular Mechanics Magazine, met almost exactly at this deadline, because one entered one block only five seconds after the other had entered the adjoining block. Other factors contributing to the accident were the facts that the dispatchers' orders were defective and that a heavy fog obscured the right of way. Each train was drawn by two big locomotives. Two men were slightly injured in the crash.

A courageous young man who gallantly went to the rescue of three helpless children trapped in a motorboat, which was surrounded by a blaze of ignited gasoline, is the hero of an exciting account in the October issue of Popular Mechanics Magazine. How he solved the difficulty of their rescue is picturesquely described and illustrated.
