Royals Conquer Stampers 7-3 In Opening Game

TORONTO, April 27 — (CP) — It's been 17 years since the Allan Cup last rested in the hometown of its donor, but the eager, hard-skating Montreal Royals gave notice Saturday night they might be the team to bring it back.

They outplayed the present holders of the Sir Montague Allan's trophy to score an easy 7-3 victory over Calgary Stampers in the first game of a best-of-seven series for the Canadian senior hockey championship.

After the first 10 minutes when the Stampers led for the only time in the game on Joe Fisher's solo goal, there was little doubt in the minds of the 11,300 odd fans as to the final outcome.

The picture reversed suddenly at mid-period and a pair of tallies within 35 seconds off the sticks of Cliff Malone and Doug Harvey gave the eastern champions a lead they never relinquished.

A second period goal by Floyd Curry set up by Rip Riepelle gave the Royals a 3-1 lead and they outscored Stampers 4-2 in the lively, goal-filled last frame to gain the handily winning margin.

Malone shone around the nets for the winners with two goals and two assists. Tod Campeau scored one and helped on two others while Jerry Plamondon and Pete Morin scored the others.

Stampers were kept off the score sheet from the time Fisher scored at 1:47 of the first period until midway through the final period when Red Hunter tipped in a blueline shot from Syd Shoukist. Duke Grant added Calgary's final goal with about five minutes left on a passing play with Bo Brownridge and Craddock.

The game was light-checking, both teams sticking strictly to business as was indicated by the six penalties — four to Montreal and two to Calgary.

Much of the time it was scrambling hockey with Montreal seemingly taking advantage of sudden lapses by the usually scrappy Calgary defence. The westerners for the most part looked leg-weary and came to life only in sudden bursts. When they did break out they were exceptionally dangerous, serving to indicate they're far from out of the picture.

Their long lay-off and the three-day train ride from the west gave onlookers reason to believe the Stampers were just getting a bad case out of their system and that the second game, in Montreal Tuesday night, might play a different tune.

Chi-Cubs Continue Mastery Over Cards With Weekend Wins

That's the big question around the National League today after the week-end's games in which Chicago Cubs trounced St. Louis Cardinals twice to run the world champions losing streak to five games and leave them solidly entrenched in the cellar along with New York Giants, who weren't expected to do much anyway.

Southpaw Johnny Schemitz hand-cuffed the Cards with four hits at Chicago yesterday as Cubs blanked the Gas House Gang 3-0, after Bob Chipman outpitched Harry (The Cat) Brecheen for a 4-1 win Saturday. Cubs now have won four out of five meetings this year with Eddie Dyer's crew.

Philadelphia Phillies handed Boston Braves a pair of 5-4 setbacks yesterday to end a four-game losing streak after Mort Cooper held them to four hits as Braves won the Saturday fixture 7-1.

Brooklyn Dodgers clinaxed an up-hill battle at Brooklyn before a Sunday crowd as they pushed a run across in the last half of the ninth for a 9-8 slugfest win over New York Giants. The Bums hammered the "Jerms" 7-3 on Saturday.

Those two wins shoved Brooklyn to the top of the heap, as Pittsburgh Pirates dropped a 3-2 decision to Cincinnati Reds Saturday and then lost two more yesterday by scores of 6-1 and 2-1.

That dropped Pirates, who led the loop up to now into third place behind Dodgers and Cubs and left them a few percentage points ahead of the fusing Reds.

At Chicago Sunday, the Cubs were able to collect only five hits off Murry Dickson of Cards but they bunched them effectively, with Bill Nicholson's double in the fourth and Stan Musial's error in the eighth helping the Redbirds to defeat.

Ed (Stinky) Stanky's squeeze punt with one out and the bases loaded scored pinchhitter Marv Raelkey with the winning run in the ninth at Brooklyn after Dodgers and Giants had slugged merrily through the piece.

Johnny Mize cracked his sixth homer for the Giants and Walker Cooper blasted a big one. Cookie Lavagetto socked a circuit-ridger for the Dodgers.

Trailing 8-4 going into their half of the seventh, Dodgers scored two on Carl Furillo's homer and added two more in the eighth, during which starter Dave Koslo was blasted from the mound. Pete Reiser drove in the tying run with a double. Gene Thompson, Koslo's successor.
