Woman Struggles Through Tempest To Save Vessels

PURCELL'S COVE, Nov. 10-(C. P.)-Through wind and rain, across two miles of storm-swept beach, a middle-aged woman braved the fury of an autumn hurricane to carry a warning message that saved this village's fishing fleet. Mrs. William Icton was asleep when the storm made its violence felt in her home by ripping the roof off a shed in the backyard. She failed to awake, but her husband did. And as he looked seaward through the bedroom window he saw the fleet was in danger. A terrific windstorm was raking the coast. Huge seas, lashed to turmoil, were sweeping shoreward; in their path lay vessels of the fleet, threatened momentarily with destruction against the rocky shore. Already, some were dragging anchor. Icton could not leave the house; he was a semi-invalid from a badly burned arm. But he roused his wife, and she decided to set out to warn the village's unsuspecting fishermen. Lantern in hand, she started into the teeth of the hurricane. She had pushed on only a short distance when a wild gust of wind snatched the light from her hand and dashed it against a rock. To go on through the darkness would have been suicidal. She returned to the house, got a flashlight, and set out again. All along her path dangers of the storm beset her. Big trees, uprooted by the fierce gale, were crashing to earth. The driving rain made visibility poor, and there was the danger of falling on the rocks, or stumbling into some unseen hole. But she went on. Fighting for every step against the 50 mile gale, she reached every home in the fishing village, waking the occupants to warn them of the peril of their boats. As she came to each home with her message, the fishermen hastily donned boots and oilskins and set out for the ships. The larger craft, lying offshore, were piloted to the leeward of the cove, where the angry seas could do no harm. Most of the smaller boats were brought to the shore in safety. Two rowboats were lost, but with these exceptions the fleet escaped.

May Follow Danes Lead

SAINT JOHN, N.B., Nov. 10-(C. P.)-Establishment of hog raisers' co-operatives in New Brunswick, similar to those functioning in Denmark has been recommended to the Saint John Board of Trade by Rev. R. Miller, of Saint John, Lutheran clergyman whose congregation includes some 2,000 Scandinavians in the Maritime Provinces, mostly Danish people settled in rural communities. Danes residing in the Sussex district of New Brunswick and familiar with hog-raising and marketing methods of Denmark would show the way if given support in organizing, Mr. Miller said, making it clear that any hog-raiser's co-operatives would be not only for Danish agriculturists but for all farmers caring to join the plan. H. M. Scandlers, Commissioner of the Board of Trade said the Board would take up the suggestion with the provincial Department of Agriculture, and added the Board had long advocated some such scheme for the raising of hogs on a much larger scale. Indicating the success of co-operative organization in Denmark, Mr. Miller remarked that Great Britain paid a premium on Danish bacon and that in 1930, the last year for which he had figures, Denmark shipped to Great Britain 305,893 long tons of bacon as compared to 4,966 long tons from Canada. The idea would be, said Mr. Miller, for each co-operative farmer to agree to produce a certain number of hogs for delivery at a given time, and orders for the total number would be secured by packing firms. He stressed the importance of proper feeding, saying the Maritimes had the right type of hogs but they were not fed uniformly, with the result the bacon produced was not uniform.

N.S. Gov. To Call For Bond Tenders

(Canadian Press) HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 9.-Public tender for \$5,000,000 Nova Scotia government bonds will be called tomorrow morning, it was announced late tonight by Premier Angus L. Macdonald. Proceeds from the bonds, bearing interest of 4 1/2 percent, maturing in 1945 and 1953, will be used for unemployment relief, highway, land settlement and general public service expenditures. The bonds will be in denominations of \$1,000. Tenders will close Nov. 15.

SEES REACTION TO DOMESTIC POLICY OF U.S.

TORONTO, Nov. 9.-Chances of any single country in the world-even the United States-bringing about a revival of trade through purely domestic effort and without a revival in the world market are "strictly limited," J. A. McLeod, President of the Canadian Bankers' Association, declared today in his farewell presidential address to the Association. "It is still true that there are still some who believe that a country, by pursuing appropriate domestic policies, can escape from the consequences of a drastically diminished world market," he said. "This conviction has found expression in recent months among our neighbors in the United States; and there has been a determined, in part successful, effort to raise the domestic level of commodity prices there. "I think however-and recent events appear to confirm this view-that even in so large and important a land as the United States the possibilities of reaching such an objective by purely national policies and without a revival of the world market, are very strictly limited. "It is becoming daily more evident that the supreme test of these policies is approaching, and that the fortunes, not of the United States only, but of several other countries, will depend on the outcome of this test."

Part Successful

The annual meeting elected Jackson Dods, General Manager of the Bank of Montreal, to succeed Mr. McLeod as President. General Managers of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Royal Bank of Canada, Bank of Toronto and Dominion-S. H. Logan, M. W. Wilson, H. B. Henwood and Dudley Dawson-were named Vice Presidents. Since the depression set in on the world in 1929, Mr. McLeod said, three-eighths of the world's trade has disappeared. He said this figure was based on trade statistics of the 19 countries which at the height of prosperity did 75 per cent of trading. "I can perhaps best illustrate the situation that confronts us today by putting it in this manner; the reduction that has occurred in the trade of these 19 countries, taken together, results in a curtailment equivalent to that which would have to be faced if the trade of the five countries leading in volume-the United Kingdom, United States, Germany, France and Canada-had been unaffected since 1929, and if the whole of the exports of the remaining 14 countries-Italy, Switzerland, the Netherlands, Belgium, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Sweden, Denmark, Norway, Australia, New Zealand, British India, Japan and the Argentine Republic-had been totally destroyed.

Indebted to Commission

"If a blockade, or some such cause, had destroyed altogether the trade of these 14 countries, this event would have arrested the attention of mankind, and would remain a vivid memory for generations. It is, nevertheless, true that the result of the depression in this contraction of international trade has been the equivalent of such a blockade, by land and sea."
