HORSES THAT WILL "TAKE THE WORD" THIS AFTERNOON

Exceptional Fast And Exciting Races Expected in Every Race; In Fact Every Heat Has Promise of Being "Nerve Testers" For The Thousands Who Will Be in Attendance.

The horse races in connection with the Provincial Exhibition promise to be unusually interesting this year on account of the fact that the horses entered are very closely matched. There will be three races on Wednesday, three on Thursday and three on Friday. Today's races are as follows:

2.21 Class Trot Stake, Purse \$500

In this race the following horses are sure starters:

Captain Jackson, 2.20 1/4, owned by Mr. Charles H. Chandler. This horse has been stopping miles in around 2:18 and has trials around 2:12 1/4. Mr. Chandler's many friends are hoping that he will come under the wire "one, one, one."

Miss Belle Rice, 2:18 1/4, owned by Col. D. A. MacKinnon, Charlottetown. Belle Rice has not been topping any summaries very frequently within the last two or three years, but is in pretty good shape and may be a factor in the race.

Little Nig, 2:19 1/4, owned by P. A. Farquharson. This horse has lots of speed and recently worked a mile in 2:18 comfortably. He won several races in the United States on the trot.

Princess Aubrey, 2:18 1/4, owned by D. A. McPhee, has been showing wonderful speed this year, and looks to be about the best in this class.

Seldom C., 2:18 1/4. This mare is owned by Mr. Merriam of Parrsboro, N. S. She was a winner at New Annapolis, and surely will be one of the many winners here. The above class will be ripping racing and well worth going many miles to see.

2.40 Class Trot, Stake, Purse \$500

There will be at least eight starters in this class and almost every one of them has sufficient to make every owner think he has a winner. Particular mention may be made of Eileen Aubrey 2:24 1/4, owned by Simpson Bros., Amherst, N. S. This mare won the Labor Day race at Halifax in easy fashion and looked like a 2:16 trotter.
