Barbers Rebel at Bobs for Women

NEW YORK, May 22—Underneath the wish to earn \$25 a week instead of \$20, which made all the tonorial artists of Broome street and the Bowery throw down their clipper on Sunday in a grand revolutionary gesture, there lies a real grievance. Women do not blam for all sorts of things. Now it's the barbers strike, or if one is a stickler for precision, the bobber's strike. Nevertheless down on Broome Street and the Bowery they are one and the same thing.

John Arena will tell you about it. He owns an aristocratic parlor at 160 Broome St., which used to be the place where all the sweller-gents went. Now, he says, it's the place where all the swell ladies go as well, in consequence of which he has had to learn all the intricacies, not only of shearing off tresses but the psychology located under those tresses. He says he used to have some leisure but what with the women his leisure has been cut as short as his hair.

They all have the same complaint. Even over in Brownsville section of Brooklyn barbers walked out, on a Sunday for more pay, something for which people have walked out before but in reality because the female of the species has been so trying on the nerves of the barber. It was expected that more than 1,000 harassed members of the profession would be idle.

The first intimation of the strike came early on Sunday, when out side each parlor there were visible signs of anxious persons, whose appearance were almost invariably, barbers huddled out of bed at 5 o'clock to accommodate crows who wanted to make sure at least of a weekly grooming. It was estimated that there were 8,567 more shaves and haircuts in evidence on Grand Street yesterday than on any single Sunday have been since the war, not excluding even Easter.

**GERMAN GIRLS PREFER STRIKE PAY TO WORK.**  
ESSEN, May 22.—Thousands of women and girls have been thrown out of work due to the closing of factories in France and Belgium occupation, but nevertheless domestic production is as difficult to acquire as in the cities of the United States. This is largely due to the fact that the women and girls draw strike funds of one kind or another, either from the municipalities or from the German government which usually amount to more than they would receive for household services.

In many instances the women are furnished lodging and food by the authorities and in addition, as part of the passive resistance program, they get a weekly allowance of marks as pin money. Near Essen an old German barracks has been converted into a sort of camp for unemployed women and in this place alone more than 400 women are quartered.

Germany says there was never a time in recent years when servants were so scarce as today. The French and Belgian officers' families now in the Ruhr and Rhineland have the greatest difficulty in requisitioning cooks, maids and nurses, and often have to pay a premium to the German women as an inducement to come and work for them.

**"INVINCIBLE" MEANS ARE NOT VANQUISHED**

**DECLARES WOMEN CAUSE HALF OF WORLD'S WOES**

LONDON, May 22.—Half the miseries of the western world are caused by women, according to a declaration made by Dr. Joseph Oldfield, the eminent British physician, lawyer and author, in a recent London address. In spite of countless years of experience, the doctor added, women had failed to excel even in cooking, yet they set up as competitors of men in all walks of life.

"Far more losses are made in business by nervous women," he said, "than by dominant or brutal men."

"Women," continued Dr. Oldfield, "have been tinkered on the automobile and plane through all the ages, but it is among men that the organic muscles are found." In the sphere of art also, Dr. Oldfield said that although women had been busy painting their lips and faces, less than one would credit, for counting their nails and extending their fingers, they would create emotions of the highest and best character for all time, one has to go to paintings done by men.

Women are imitative and not creative," said the English critic. "If search is made by Westminster Abbey for records of the great women of England, one will find a few actresses and courtesans, but none who were worthy of being commemorated as poets, painters or world benefactors."

Having charged women with neglecting the most sacred duties of motherhood and with having neglected the doubtful pleasures of self and public life in place of self, Dr. Oldfield said that men were consoled by saying they were superior and should be venerated as poets, painters or world benefactors.
