EXCITING MEETING—Great excitement prevailed at the political meeting at Corran Ban Bridge last night. Mr. P. J. Brown brought with him to assist him on the stump, Mr. John W. Bruce, a labor organizer of Australian birth lately from Ontario. After the addresses of the candidates Mr. Bruce in a stentorian voice denounced both political parties, and appealed to farmers to unite with the labor element and overwhelm the government. He had opposed conscription and directed loud voiced criticism against the governments war debt. After his address—the very noise of which had succeeded in throwing the audience into commotion—Mr. John H. Myers, in a terse, ten-minute address, punctured the arguments of the labor agitator very effectively. He appealed to the cool reason of the audience and his words had a remarkable effect. He also denounced as untrue a statement made by Mr. D. A. MacKinnon to the effect that disunity was made free of duty to Canada in order to benefit the wealthy classes. Only uncut diamonds are admitted free, and this Mr. MacKinnon was quite peeved at Mr. Myers' denunciation. A full report of the meeting will appear tomorrow.

DELIGHTFUL RECITAL—An evening of rare pleasure was the lot of those who attended the delightful Drummond recital given by Rev. D. E. Hatt at the Baptist Church last night. Mr. Hatt opened the evening's entertainment with a brief sketch of Drummond's life personality and literary work, after which he read most dramatically a number of such splendid poems as "Lac Seul," "Le Vieux Temps," "Johnny Courkan," "When Albani Sang," etc. Mr. Hatt's knowledge of Drummond's work and his intimate acquaintance with the type of characters portrayed, coupled with his gifts as an elocutionist, make him one of the finest interpreters of Drummond that a Charlottetown audience has ever been privileged to hear. During an interval in the programme a very tuneful solo was given by Mr. J. G. Pagon which was greatly appreciated. At the Baptist Church this evening Mr. Hatt gives another entertainment the programme of which is entirely original poetry.

Better Times Ahead Says Prem. Meighen

WELLINGTON, Ont., Oct. 31—"Our tariff needs revision, declared Premier Meighen in his address to 3,000 electors, Hon MacKenzie King wants to know if I will revise it upward or downward, whether it is revised upward or downward there will be a tariff sufficient to retain industries in this country and to enable them to expand. If it appears that an industry is enjoying more protection than it requires to, duties will go down. I cannot say whether the general level of tariff will go up or down. We are pledged however, to the general principle of protection." The Prime Minister contrasted that position with the position of the Liberal and Agrarian parties both of which were pledged to strip the essential industries of the countries of all protection. "We'll have better times when the tariff issue is settled," asserted the Prime Minister. "We'll have fewer men out of employment, we shall have still better times when the tariff is revised."

Terrific Cloudburst In British Columbia

VANCOUVER, Oct. 31—Many lives have been lost and scores injured, just how many has as yet not been ascertained, when a portion of the mining town of Britannia beach was swept away as result of a cloudburst last night. Four doctors and eight nurses left here this morning by special train for the scene of the disaster. According to reports reaching here today the town has been practically destroyed by a stream of water which dashed down the mountain side carrying cottages and other buildings to the beach which was littered with debris. Britannia beach is a mining town with a population of about 1,500 persons and situated on the mountainside 18 miles from here on Howe Sound.

VANCOUVER, Oct. 31—The flood waters of the Coquitlam river have inundated a section of the town of Port Coquitlam, 14 miles east of here, and several buildings are reported to have been shifted from their foundations. Owing to the recent rains, the river overflowed its banks. The Canadian Pacific Railway bridge is reported to have been carried away, cutting off communications between city and interior points. The railway bridge over Slave River is also reported carried away. Mud slides, as the result of the rain have occurred on the Canadian National Railway at Boston Bar, holding up traffic on that line. Flood waters of the Capilano River on the north shore of Burrard inlet have also tied up railway traffic on the Pacific Great Eastern. At Coquitlam it is stated that the hotel, store and several cottages have been carried off their foundations. Indications this morning are that floods will recede as the heavy rainstorm, which continued for three days, ceased and the weather is clearing. The amount of damage done by the floods has not been estimated.

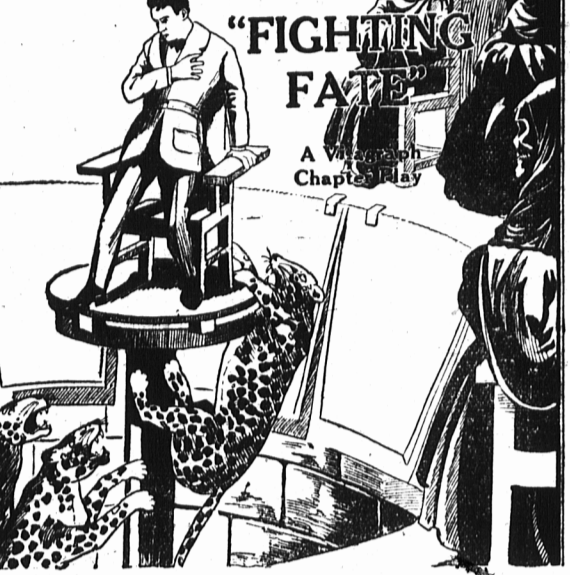
