### Final Count Is Told Over Kelly

ROCHESTER, Minn., Nov. 2. — Death today tolled off the final count for Spider Kelly, once an outstanding contender for the lightweight boxing championship.

Ending a fight of several years against disease, Spider died from a blood clot on the brain, after an operation for mastoid trouble. He was 55 years old.

Kelly, whose true name was James Patrick Curly, came here ten days ago from Tucson, Ariz., where he lived several years seeking to regain his health.

Fights that won Kelly fame included a 25 round bout with the then champion, Joe Gans, in New York, when the Spider gained a draw, although many critics gave him an edge. Gans then was at the height of his career.

A number of Kelly's fights were for 40 rounds, and he often had a gruelling bout every month.

PARIS, Nov. 2. — Three English football teams invaded the continent today and were successful in winning one game and tying the other two. Blackheath, of the Rugby Union playing here, defeated the Racing Club of France by 13 points to 0. In a scheduled inter-league match, the London Soccer team drew with a Paris eleven, one goal each, while at Brussels a team representing the London Football Association, and the Diablos Rouges drew three goals to three.

## RING VETERAN FELLED THRICE UNABLE TO DEFEND HIMSELF

COLISEUM, Chicago, Nov. 2. — Mickey Walker, world's middleweight champion, knocked out Mike McTigue, former light-heavyweight champion, in the first round of a scheduled 10-round fight in the Coliseum here tonight.

McTigue, the Muthuselah of the ring, was knocked down three times before he fell across the middle rope of the ring, his hands at his side, his eyes closed, helpless and unable to defend himself. There he was counted out.

The end came two minutes and 15 seconds after the fight started. Walker, boxing cautiously, did not get warmed up until a few punches had been exchanged—then he suddenly lashed out with a right to the jaw, following it up with a left hook which knocked the venerable McTigue into the ropes.

Walker sailed in, driving terrific punches to the jaw, and McTigue looking like an old man, started sliding to the floor, but fell across the second rope and hung there.

Great interest is being taken in the coming scrap and if there is as many interested in the fight as there is in seeing the boys work out it looks like a packed house for the Arena.

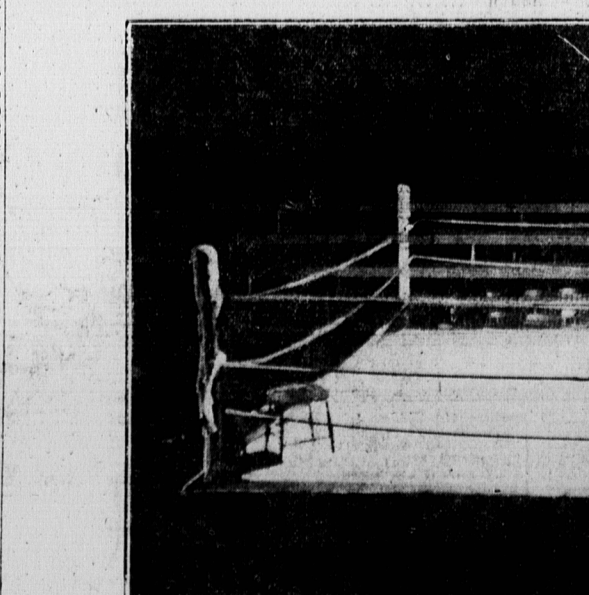

CHICAGO, Nov. 2. — The first move toward clearing the path that leads to the presidency of the American League was taken today when negotiations were virtually concluded to a syndicate headed by Alva Bradley, Cleveland millionaire, who intends to become the club president.

When the sale is completed tomorrow, E. S. Barnard, the prospective president of the American League, will be automatically relieved as president of the Cleveland club.

If the sale is not concluded, it was pointed out that Barnard could resign as president of the Indians, be elected president of the American League, and as such, proceed to lend a friendly hand in adjusting the Cleveland situation.

No opposition to the election of Barnard as president of the American League, succeeding Ban Johnson, is anticipated.

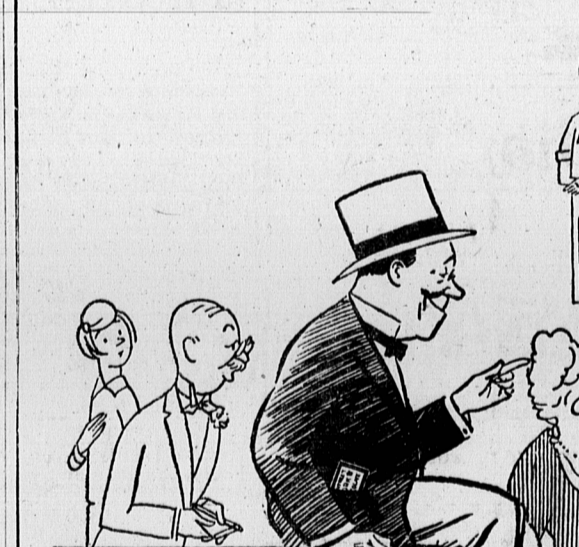

## N. Y. BOARD SPURNS HONORS FOR BASS

NEW YORK, Nov. 2. — Taking a hand in title affairs in three boxing divisions, the New York State Athletic Commission today turned down the request of Pennsylvania boxing authorities to recognize Benny Bass of Philadelphia as the world's featherweight champion. Bass, the commission reiterated, must box Tony Canzoneri of New York to settle the featherweight title situation. Negotiations for the match have been held up by the demands of Bass for a champion's percentage, 37-1-2 per cent. Meanwhile Canzoneri is matched in Boston with Red Chapman, November 14, for a bout for which title claims also are being set up. Joe Glick, New York, must box Jack Berstein before the commission's approval will be given to a match for the junior lightweight title with Ted Morgan, Seattle, the commission reiterated, scheduled at Madison Square Garden December 16. Tiger Flowers, Georgia negro middleweight, was put at the top of the commission's list of challengers for the new light-heavy weight champion, Tommy Loughran, but largely as a gesture since Loughran will not be called upon to defend his 175-pound honors for
