The exhibition was witnessed by L. W. Gleason, of Williamsport, Penn., owner of Peter Manning, and by A. M. Wright, of Chicago, who bred the champion and still owns Glendora G., the dam.

Germany Ready To Cease Resistance On Conditions

BERLIN, Aug. 14.—Dr. Gustav Stresemann, the new German Chancellor outlined in a statement today the conditions under which Germany is ready to abandon passive resistance in the Ruhr.

The conditions are complete restoration to Germany of her right of control over the Ruhr; reestablishment of conditions in the Rhineland vouchsafed her under the Versailles treaty, and liberation of every German citizen who has been outraged, evicted or imprisoned.

Monkey Gland Market Is Rising

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—Baboons and chimpanzees expressed bitter opposition from the first and now they are lining up against science's traffic in Glands. It's all very well for millionaires who feel themselves slipping, but for the simians and the animal men the situation is serious.

Ever since Dr. Serge Voronoff announced in Paris that he had succeeded in giving the aged a new lease on life by transplanting monkey glands, chimpanzees and the larger baboons have been in increasing demand. They are now very difficult for the zoos to get, and animal men say if the price goes much higher only doctors with wealthy patients can afford them.

"Vigorous male chimpanzees have gone up 300 to 500 per cent in price in the last three years," Frederick Mitchell, president of William Bartels Co., animal importers says. "We sold one for \$2,200 other day for \$2,200. When a millionaire's doctor wants one what chance has a mere animal dealer?"

Miss Edith Adelson, secretary to C. W. Bostock, said that firm had been forced to write to Col. A. Stepan general manager of the Cincinnati Zoo an old customer and one of the best known animal men in the country, that they could not supply him with a "prime, full grown male" he wanted because of the scarcity.

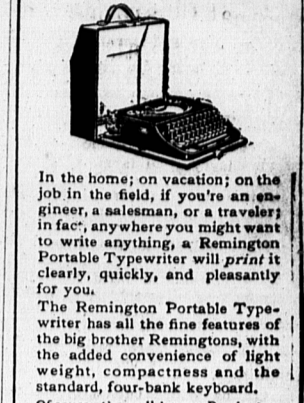
Hagenbeck Brothers, Hoboken, have been quick to see profit in the new "monkey business," and have sold more than 30 chimpanzees and chacma baboons to hospitals for local operations since Jan. 1.

"About 20 of them went to a New York hospital," he said.

ENGLAND AND PROHIBITION

LONDON, Aug. 14.—Curiously enough England continues to be almost more interested in the success—or failure—of prohibition in America than the Americans themselves. No Canadian or American can long remain in conversation with a group of Englishmen before the topic of prohibition is brought up. Most Englishmen seem to find it almost impossible to believe that such a thing is possible. Their attitude is that of the farmer who first saw a camel. "There ain't no such animal." The weekly reviews without exception publish articles on this subject. The daily papers feature news from America that has any bearing on the topic, and everyone in England with the exception of the comparatively small groups of temperance workers say "well, it will never come here."

More acute observers place the coming of prohibition at a minimum of twenty-five and a maximum of fifty years from now.
