A MONTH'S WORK IN SOUTH AFRICA.

LONDON, June, 10.—(Special).—Lord Kitchener reports 2,940 Boers killed, imprisoned or surrendered during May and so far this month 26 killed, 4 wounded, 409 made prisoners, 33 surrendered, with 651 rifles, 120 wagons, 4,000 horses and 115,550 rounds of ammunition captured.

RELATION OF COUNCIL TO PROHIBITION ACT

The Tenders For Street Lighting Submitted—No Action Taken.

DELEGATION FROM MONUMENT COMMITTEE

Waits Upon Council Asking For a Grant—Committee Appointed to Arrange For Reception of Lord Minto—Condition of Government Pond and Jail Fence Reviewed—The Watering Cart and the Paper Nuisance Dealt With.

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held in the Council Chamber last night, His Worship Mayor Warburton, Couns. Wheat, McDonald, Lyons, Tanton, Horne, Kelly, Taylor, Brown being present.

After His Worship had welcomed Dr. Kelly to the Council Board the minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted.

A communication was read from the Secretary of the School Board intimating that the term of office of Mr. W. S. Stewart as a member of the School Board had expired. Mr. W. S. Stewart was re-appointed.

His Worship the Mayor called attention to the fact that as the summer months are here the matter of music in the gardens should be looked into.

Coun. Brown moved that \$100 be given to the Fourth Regiment and League of the Cross Bands. The motion carried and a committee was appointed to deal with the matter. The existence of other bands was the reason for the appointing of the committee.

Coun. Brown then submitted the tenders for street lighting. Two tenders were received, viz. Full, \$89.50, P. E. Island Electric Co. \$95. The latter tender was accompanied by a proposition that the city lease the plant of the P. E. I. Electric Co. offering to lease their plant for \$2500 a year for 5 to 10 years.

Coun. Brown said that he would like to see the latter proposition looked into before action is taken.

Coun. Wheat said there is a big question to be considered in the leasing of the plant. Although there was a plebiscite there was certain prejudice and full data was not before the people. He had heard it remarked by citizens that they were not in favor of going into street lighting alone. He would like to see the matter considered at a special meeting. Before going into the matter he would be in favor of having an electrician to inspect the plant. He believed a competent electrician could be secured in Halifax or St. John to look into the matter. Municipal ownership is on thing and the leasing of the plant another. After referring to the onward march of electricity he moved that the matter lay over until such time as a meeting could be called.

Coun. Horne expressed himself as not in favor of leasing the "old" plant. He said it would cost as much to keep it in repair as the machines are worth. If the Company are not making any money out of the old machinery it is not likely that the city will.

Coun. Brown thought that it would be an easy matter to ascertain how much had been spent in repairs by looking over

the books of the company. He was in favor of leasing the plant for two years.

Coun. Lyons said that when tenders were called for it is now the duty of the council to accept the lowest tender. He would not object to leaving the matter over but he considered the proper sensible way to accept the tender.

Coun. Taylor expressed himself as very strongly opposed to the Full Co. receiving the contract.

Coun. Tanton agreed with Coun. Lyons statements. To take the electric plant over and keep it in repair was rather too expensive. He thought that delaying the letting of the contract was useless.

Coun. Kelly said that under existing circumstances the lowest must be awarded the contract. He would suggest that both companies be allowed to extend the same offer and that an electrician be given with a guarantee to keep the plant in order.

The matter was then allowed to lie over for a further meeting to be called for the purpose.

Messrs. Percy Pope, P. Blake and J. E. B. McCready on behalf of the Monument Committee waited upon the Council praying for a grant toward the Monument fund. Mr. Percy Pope presented a memorial to the Council stating that with disappointment was felt at the small grant made by the Government and that \$600 was still required. He then submitted plans and estimates after which the other members of the committee urged upon the Council the necessity of a liberal grant.

After the matter had been fully discussed by Couns. Wheat, Taylor, Brown, Horne, Lyons and Tanton a grant of \$900 was made. All the Councillors regretted the amount could not be made larger.

In accordance with a notice of resolution given at last meeting, Coun. Tanton moved that the salary of the Recorder be \$350, and Stipendiary Magistrate \$630 as a full compensation for all services and fees in connection with the office. After some cross firing between the mover and seconder the resolution was laid over.

Coun. Brown then moved the following resolution seconded by Coun. Taylor: Whereas the Prohibition Act 1900 came into force in this city on the 5th June inst.

And whereas the said Act was passed by the Local Legislature without consulting the then Council in regard to the same or without having the same first submitted to a vote of the citizens for their approval.

And whereas grave doubts exist as to the constitutionality of said Act and the city may be incited in heavy damages in the event of its officers taking part in the enforcement of said Act.

And whereas Premier and Attorney General of the Province have publicly stated that the Government intend to take the full responsibility of enforcing the Act and of bearing all expense in connection with such enforcement and in as much as two thirds of all fines are to be paid into the Provincial Treasury.

Therefore resolved that in view of all the circumstances it would be against the interest of the citizens that the City by its officers or servants should in any way interfere in prosecutions brought under the said Act so as to render the city liable for damages in respect thereof.

And further resolved that the Police Committee be authorized to instruct the Marshall and Police Officers as to their duties in reference to said Act as embodied in this resolution.

The resolution passed without discussion, Councillor Tanton being the only one voting against it.

Upon motion of Coun. Wheat the Mayor and City Council were appointed a committee with full power to make arrangements for the reception of Lord Minto and party.

Coun. Kelly moved a resolution condemning the condition of the Government Pond and the jail fence. Couns. Lyons and Wheat also spoke strongly condemning the condition of the pond and the fence as well. A committee was appointed to wait upon Government.

Coun. Wheat suggested that the watering cart be kept in the business portion of the city as great complaint had been made of late by the merchants.

The Mayor reported that he was negotiating with the Water Commissioners for the placing of proper pipes to fill the cart.

Dr. Kelly was then appointed chairman of the market committee.

The distributing of paper on the public squares was condemned and definite action will be taken to prevent the distribution as such as possible.

Council adjourned.
