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RUSSIANS AND TURKS IN GIGANTIC PLOT

Believed Contemplated Alliance Between Russians and Turks is Intended for Action Against English, French and Greeks, with Designs Against Egypt.

ROME, May 23.—Nature of reported alliance between Russian Bolsheviks and Turkish nationalist appears to be a gigantic plot against English, French and Greeks in Thrace, Syria, Cilicia, Persia and Mesopotamia, the Epoch's Constantinople correspondent said in a despatch today. At present

25,000 Communists
Reviewed in Moscow

(Special to The Guardian.)
MOSCOW, May 23.—A body of 25,000 were reviewed on parade yesterday by the English trades union delegates who are visiting Moscow. The review took place in the square under the walls of the Kremlin where a hundred communist victims of the revolution lie buried. Twelve thousand Communist factory workers organized into volunteer militia regiments fully armed and equipped, formed part of the procession.

About the New Federal Tax

The following information is issued by Mr. F. J. Casey, Collector of Inland Revenue, to the Public, who are affected by the Excise Tax recently issued.

This tax applies to sales fully completed, prior to, but delivered after May 19th. Luxury and sales tax applicable to goods shipped, or delivered after May 19th. One per cent sales tax is collectable on contracts, and sales made previous to 19th, and delivered after that date. This of course, also applies to sales, and contracts made after that date. Tax is to be collected on all goods subject to tax starting May 19th. Ten per cent tax is to include Electrical appliances, such as Electric Irons, Toasters, Percolators; or partly nickel plated. Plated Electrical appliances mentioned adopted for household use. Wholesalers must pay tax on sales also one per cent sales tax. Coke is subject to sales tax. Jams made of fruit, and sugar, canned vegetables, and fruits, grape juice, jams, canned fruit, and juice, are subject to sales tax. Cameras, candy, confectionery, chewing gum, firearms, cartridges, pianos, organs, musical instruments, playing cards, in stock at the present time by the retailers, and being sold retail by them are not subject to tax.

Train Wreck In Ohio, U. S.

All German Armaments Belong to Allies

Persian Minister Appeals to Britain

LONDON, May 23.—The Persian Foreign Minister has left Teheran for London to discuss the situation brought about by the Russian Soviet occupation of Ensele. It was reported here today, Persia, according to the report, has appealed to the Allies in addition to her appeal to the League of Nations to protect her from Russian aggression. The leader of the Russian forces was said to have promised the British commander of Persia that Soviet forces in Ensele would be withdrawn soon.

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PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE CLOSES ITS LABOURS

Prorogued in Due Form by His Honour Lieutenant Governor. Government Refuses to Enter on Journal of the House the Minority Report of Public Accounts.

The House opened on Saturday at 11.15, and with closed doors dealt with contingent accounts. The minority report of Hon. A. E. Arsenault and Mr. H. D. McLean, of the Public Accounts Committee, by a unanimous vote of the House was ordered to be received and read.

It contained a statement of accounts prepared by Mr. John Anderson, Provincial Auditor, and a synopsis of sworn evidence taken before the committee. This was read by the clerk of the House.

Mr. H. E. McLean, in the absence of Hon. Mr. Arsenault, moved that the report be adopted. Hon. Mr. Bell moved that the report be not entered on the Journals of the House.

MR. J. D. STEWART objected that this was unusual and without precedent—that all matters brought before the House by a vote and the authority of the House have always been placed upon record and that without this the Journals would not be a correct record of the proceedings of the Legislature. He asked the Premier if he could point to any precedent whatever for so extraordinary a procedure.

The Premier made no reply. His Honor Lieut. Governor MacKinnon, accompanied by his private secretary and aides de camp, and preceded by the Gentleman Usher of Black Rod, arrived at the Legislative Chamber a few minutes after 12 o'clock, and assented to the various bills passed, after which he delivered the following:

Speech from the Throne.
Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:—In bringing your legislative duties for the present session to a close, I desire to extend to you my sincere appreciation of the earnest and capable manner with which you have attended to the public service, and to the discharge of the onerous duties dependent upon you.

This has been one of the epoch-making sessions of the Legislature, and I heartily congratulate you upon the measures which you have enacted. In this reconstruction period, you have evidenced that you appreciate the extent of your responsibility to the people, and this is especially manifested in the numerous measures and important legislation you have passed, for the fostering and further development of agriculture, the improvement of the roads and the promoting of education, all of which are in the best interests of our country and make for the welfare of the people.

I confidently hope that these important enactments will result most favorably for the Province. I thank you for the generous provision you have made for the carrying on of all that enters into the public service, and assure you that it shall be the aim of my Government to exercise due economy in the expenditure thereof.

The Decline in Cotton

LONDON, May 23.—The week's sensational decline in cotton prices was interpreted by some newspapers today as the beginning of a general decline in prices in the British Isles. Cotton has dropped 14 cents a pound since Thursday, and more than 30 per cent since February. Wool prices also have declined. The press generally was inclined however to doubt whether the price of clothing and fabric goods would be affected immediately pointing out that present stocks of manufactured products were made from cotton and wool purchased at peak prices.
