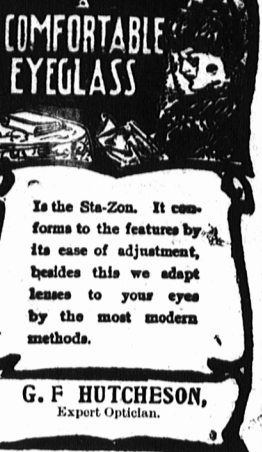
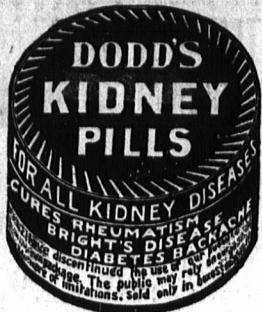


\$150,000 NASHVILLE FIRE.

A BIGGER NAVY TO RULE PACIFIC

Sir J. Colomb Says Britain Must Keep Eyes Open: Admiralty-Secretary Refuses Detail of New Battleships for Strategic Reasons.

LONDON, July 6.—During the discussion of the naval estimates in the House of Commons Mr. Edmund Robertson, Liberal, a former Civil Lord of the Admiralty, asked for further information concerning the new battleships. Mr. Pleydell, secretary of the Admiralty, replied at length, claiming the highest efficiency for the navy under the new scheme. He declined for strategic reasons to give particulars of the new battleships, but said Great Britain proposed to lead and not follow other nations in naval construction. Sir John Colomb, Conservative, formerly a captain in the Royal Marine Artillery, said he did not agree with the Opposition speakers in saying the time had come when the naval expenditure might be reduced. On the contrary, Sir John said, everything pointed to the necessity for keeping up the naval strength of Great Britain. The real question now was, "Who is going to rule the Pacific?" President Roosevelt said the United States in-

tended to rule the Pacific. The United States was giving every sign that this was her intention by the extraordinary increase in her naval power. Continuing, Sir John pointed out that in the not distant future questions would arise in the Pacific affecting the policy of Japan, the United States and Great Britain. He asked what Great Britain was doing against the time when her interests ceased to be identical with those of the two great powers whose naval bases were in the Pacific. No one believed that the Anglo-Japanese alliance would last forever. Great Britain looked with dread and horror to a rupture with the United States, but she could not shut her eyes to the fact that ruptures had occurred between the most friendly nations. Sir John asked what the Government was doing to relieve Canada and the British colonies of the great responsibilities which they would incur when their seaports and immense interests in the Pacific were imminently threatened.

CLOSE SHOOTING AT BISLEY RANGE

Bacchus, of Westminster Reserves, Led the Scoring, Being But Four Short of a Possible.

BISLEY, June 6.—The match between the Seventh regiment, N. G. S. N. Y., and the Queen's Westminster volunteers for the Sir Howard Vincent shield began today. The weather conditions were unfavorable owing to the glare of the sun and a strong gusty wind. The teams eight men on each, to-day fired fifteen shots each at 300 and 600 yards. Rifemen from all parts of the world who were here for the regular Bisley meeting are showing keen interest in this match. To-day's competition was one of the closest ever witnessed at Bisley and keen interest was taken as the day's shooting was closing. Bacchus, one of the Westminster's reserves led the scoring. At 600 yards he scored eleven, but eyes and four inners being but four short of the possible score. Crall led the seventh with 134.

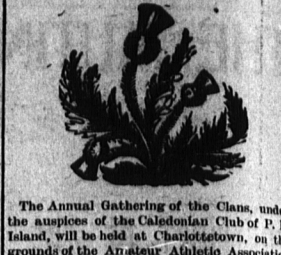
