

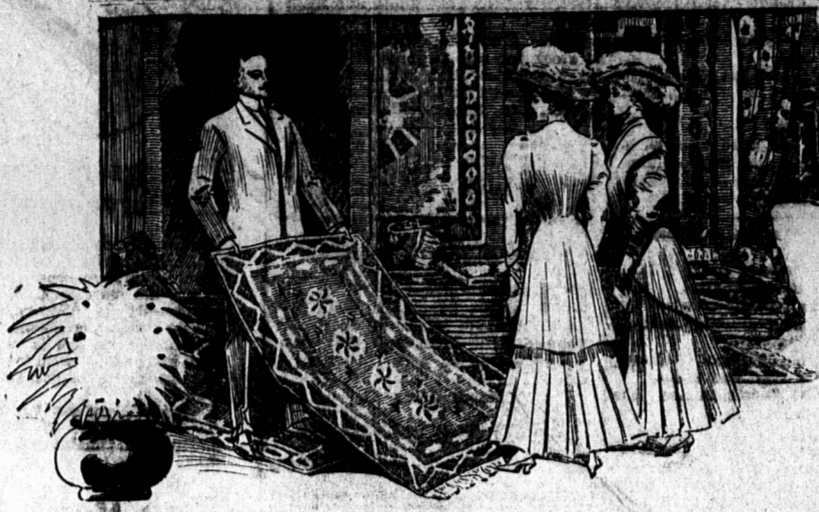

ON AN AUSTRALIAN CATTLE RANCH

It has been well said that in certain parts of Australia there are just two main industries, cattle-raising and "cattle-duffing."

The difference is that one man, the one engaged in the "raising," breeds the cattle; the other brands them with his own brand.

The "duffer's" programme is first to take up a small piece of country on the margin of a big man's station, then buy a small stock of 'reegers, say one hundred head. Some times, too, even his alleged breeders may be working bullocks—anything, in fact, that answers to the description of "cattle."

A capital of about \$1,000 will see him well on the way to a fortune. All he now has to do is to "sit tight" and avoid company. The average pastoralist does not employ a sufficient number of men to "brand up" his calves as they are born—it would be next door to impossible for him to do so, in view of the immense size of his holding and consequently the "duffer" places his own brand on every unbranded animal he comes across. These then automatically become his own.

The boundaries of these runs are more or less shadowy, which assists his operation, as also, does the fact that the high road—such as it is—anywhere usually runs through the big man's holding. In short, it is practically impossible to catch the thief, who flourishes luxuriantly. The way in which his herds increase is extraordinary.

The large station, be it remembered, may carry anything up to 40,000 head of cattle. So the small man commencing business with say two hundred head, finds apparently every one of his cows—most of them being born with two-year-old horns!

If a boundary rider is "in" with the "duffer," the latter very soon leaves the "duffer" stage, and becomes a "squatter"—in other words, a "big" man himself. His cattle—or, at any rate, a cattle carrying his brand, and so his to all intents and purposes—are now running on the original station in hundreds, and he regularly sends away lots of from 500 to 700 "fats" for sale. Or, better, still, he sells them to their original owners at \$52 or \$30 per head, station delivery.

And the station-man knows all the facts of the case. He knows these fats are the progeny of his own cattle, he knows they have been fattened on his own country, he knows the vendor's whole record—and the vendor knows that he knows—yet he buys. For he often makes another \$15 or \$20 per head on the transaction.

But he has very little redress. The difficulty of catching the thief has already been referred to. But even if he be caught red-handed, a conviction has to be secured. And it is an exceedingly difficult matter to find a jury which will convict. Many a scathing criticism of Western justice is placed by the Queensland district

MARCONI ARRIVED AT SYRACUSE, SICILY

SYRACUSE, Sicily, March 14.—William Marconi has arrived here bringing with him apparatus for experiments in Radio-telephony. He was received on board the battleship Regina Elena by the Duke of the Abruzzi, who tonight gave a dinner in honor of the inventor. He expects to spend ten days on the battleship exchanging wireless telephone messages with various points on the Mediterranean.

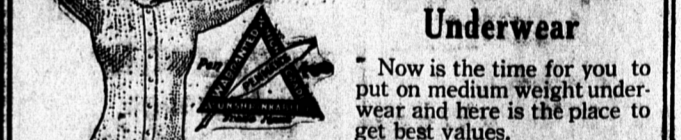
