Smelt fishermen are meeting with but poor luck in the Island bays and rivers this season.

The season opened in October here and the catch reported on October until December when the smelt were used was very small.

The fishermen are waiting for the change of moon and hope that the turn of the tide will bring them better luck.

Only 3 or 4 cars or more have been shipped so far from the Island this season.

The smelts caught here are marketed almost entirely in the English market.

The best fishing grounds are in Alport Bay, Vernon River and the East and West Rivers.

The Magdalen Island fishermen report an average catch this season.

The smelts caught there are large and of exceptionally good quality but not so numerous as in P. E. Island waters.

When the storm had up communications between New York and Montreal, and Montreal, Ottawa and Toronto, bulletins were moved by wireless to Bermuda, cabled to Halifax and sent from there to the Canadian Press transcontinental leased wire network.

In most eastern Ontario centres there was no festive New Year's dinner because there was no power for electrical stoves.

In Chazy County not one rural telephone line is in working order and no electric power is available while the town of Ingoquois near Ottawa is also still without electricity.

In Ottawa transportation service has not yet been restored to normal while Hull across the Ottawa River, is completely without street car service.

Montreal was returning to normal after transportation and communication facilities had been disrupted for more than four days.

Telephone service in the city was hard hit, with many lines still down in isolated districts.

Trains and buses ran behind schedule and in Ottawa travellers, many of them servicemen, spent the New Year holiday loitering around stations.

For a time Montreal citizens were puzzled at seeing flags at half-mast until they learned that they were frozen there and couldn't be raised or lowered.

The city of Breckville on the St. Lawrence River was isolated for three days and telegraph and telephone service to that point was still somewhat uncertain last night.

Valleyfield, Que. suffered from the power shortage, there being no night light at the Roman Catholic cathedral New Year's eve because of lack of lighting.

Trains were delayed as much as 24 hours and all highway traffic was at a standstill.

Public To Blame For Oil Shortage

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4 (AP) - Leon Henderson, speaking "as an outboard" Price Administrator, said today public "carelessness and indifference" are partly to blame for the present gas and oil situation in the Eastern United States.
