Floods in Japan.

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 4.—Officials reports just completed give details of a terrible inundation which destroyed property valued at over 6,000,000 yen, in northern Japan, in December. Thirty five towns in the district of Ishikari were devastated. Since September no less than 17,288 houses have been submerged or washed away in Hokkaido alone, while to total damage is placed at 13,000,000 yen. Complete returns show that about a hundred fishing schooners and other craft were destroyed or sunk during the severe storm which swept over the Japanese coast on Dec. 23 to 25. The total number of lives lost is placed at 189.
