Crop Report

Below will be found a brief synopsis of telegraphic reports received at the Head Office of the Bank of Montreal from its Branches. The Branch Managers have complete and intimate knowledge of each local situation and are in close touch with Crop conditions in all sections of the districts mentioned.

GENERAL

Prospects in the Prairie Provinces continue to be favorable on the whole. Wheat in most districts is heading out well but conditions vary considerably, as is shown by details given below. Extraordinarily heavy crops of all kinds are uniformly reported throughout Ontario. Heavy crops are also indicated in Quebec and Maritime Provinces. Drought in British Columbia has seriously affected hay and grain; fruit prospects, however, are fairly satisfactory. Details follow.

PRAIRIE PROVINCES

Edmonton District—more rain badly needed. Wheat in some portions heading out short. On the whole prospects are not up to expectations. Calgary district—northern portion expects fair yield and early harvest, southern portion, crops progressing favorably. Lethbridge District—conditions very favorable except Bow Island and Medicine Hat where additional moisture required; wheat heading out well; rye cutting should commence in ten days; alfalfa running 60 per cent last year's crops; continued rains have lowered quality; pasture good; hay fair. Saskatoon District, conditions vary and prospects are not promising in many localities where the crop will be short and light. Heavy general rains needed. Regina District—conditions generally continue favorable. Wheat is filling out well and indications point to good average crop, oat crop only fair. Rye harvesting has commenced, good yield. Winnipeg District—conditions continue favorable and on the whole a good crop is expected. Little or no damage from rust reported.

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC

Cereal crops are all doing well and have been helped by recent warm weather. Hay is well under way and many districts report a large crop; roots are doing well and grass pasture everywhere is in good condition.

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO

Weather conditions are conducive to good growth although rain is a little frequent. Fall wheat cutting general, crop above average, spring wheat, barley and rye in good condition with promise of heavy yield. Oats heading out well, maximum crop expected; peas good crop, corn picking up well, except average crop; hay all harvested, bumper crop. Small fruits, a heavy crop peaches, pears, and grapes, prospects excellent; root crops first class condition; pasture very good.

MARITIME PROVINCES

All crops making good progress. In some parts having commenced and a heavy crop is assured.

PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

Drought continues without sign of break, hay cutting general, crop much below average. Grains from half to two-thirds average crops, cutting commenced. Hops good crop. Okanagan fruit output estimated at over 4,000 cars against 5,000 last year, apples 3,200 cars; pears, plums and prunes a good crop, peaches and apricots a satisfactory yield. Fraser Valley, fruit prospect less favorable, apples average crop, prunes, plums and small fruit only fair; up country range is poor owing to drought and grasshoppers.

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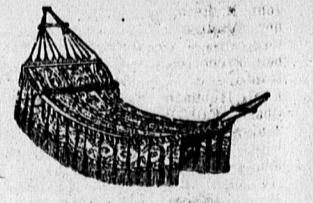
