will be found a brief synopsis of the reports received at the Office of the Bank of Montreal. The Branches have complete and intimate knowledge of each local situation and in close touch with crop conditions in all sections of the districts.

season, wheat yields in South-eastern Alberta, Southern Saskatchewan and South-western Manitoba will be small and coarse grains will produce little more than feed. The weather is unfavourable to grasshoppers, but the threat of them remains. In Quebec crops as a whole are progressing favourably. In Ontario most crops have made fair progress, although in the south-western section of the province heavy rains are urgently needed as the effects of the long dry spell are beginning to show. In the Maritime Provinces growth is below the average at this period, but is now making rapid progress. In British Columbia the weather continues favourable and conditions generally are good. Details follow:

**Prairie Provinces**  
 Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba—Early wheat is heading out of the average

height and the condition of coarse grains is good. The hail damage reported at Drumheller on the 29th ultimo was not extensive. Alberta wheat crops are satisfactory. Pasture and fodder crops have improved. Alberta Western Area—All crops are advancing favourably. Recent rains in the central area have benefited pastures and ranges. Wild hay is short but good on irrigated land. Sugar beets are making progress. Saskatchewan Northern Area—Crops are generally satisfactory and prospects continue promising. Saskatchewan Southern Area—Crops are spotty with early wheat in head and with straw short. Manitoba—In the northern area frequent showers and warmer weather have stimulated growth and prospects are good. In the eastern area moisture conditions are satisfactory and prospects

favourable. Hail damage is slight. In the western area recent rains have improved conditions, but there is no reserve moisture and the outlook is only fair.

Province of Quebec  
 Throughout all sections of the province hay lands continue to show improvement and a fair to average crop is in prospect; cutting has commenced in some districts but will not be general for another week or ten days. Grass pastures are in good condition. Grains are making satisfactory progress; root crops, particularly potatoes, are doing well. Strawberries are plentiful and are now being marketed; other small fruits promise well but the apple crop will likely be below average.

Province of Ontario  
 Fall wheat is very thin and is rip-

ening too soon for heads to fill properly. Oats and barley are heading out rapidly, but are short in straw. Meadows and pastures have shown improvement. Haying operations are general, with definite indications of a short crop. Corn, of which there is an increased acreage, is showing good growth. Root crops are doing well, especially early potatoes. Canning peas are now being harvested, with fairly good yields to date. A light apple crop is foreshadowed, owing to extensive winter damage to orchards. Tobacco, due to unfavourable planting conditions, is spotty and while plants are showing fairly satisfactory growth, more moisture would be beneficial.

Maritime Provinces  
 In Prince Edward Island crops are making rapid progress, root crops show strong growth and hay is rip-

pending well to the warm weather. Throughout New Brunswick and Nova Scotia growth of grains was retarded by cold weather but conditions are now reported more satisfactory. Potatoes are growing rapidly. Hay lands have improved slightly but a below average crop is in prospect. Grass pastures are in fair condition. In the Annapolis Valley orchards are practically free from disease and insect injury; apples set well. The yield of strawberries as a result of cold weather will be light; other small fruits look promising.

Province of British Columbia  
 In the Okanagan Valley grains promise well and should produce a normal crop. Tomatoes and onions, on a reduced acreage, are making satisfactory progress. A heavy yield of potatoes is indicated, despite a light attack from insects in the

Fraser Valley. Fruit trees continue in good condition and cherries of exceedingly good quality are now moving to market. Pasture is plentiful and moisture conditions generally are very good.
