### Latest News of the City and Province.

#### By Reporters and Correspondents Everywhere.

#### BRITAIN'S RELATIONS WITH THE POWERS.

The Relations of Britain with the European Powers was the subject of an able and timely address by Principal Anderson in St. James Hall last evening, where a large and deeply interested company attended. With maps of Europe, Asia and Africa before him the learned speaker made clear the points where the possessions of the great powers touch each other, where and in what manner their interests conflict, and gave a lucid statement of their traditional differences and the unsettled and disturbing questions of the time. Many readers of the newspapers who had the good fortune to be present will be hereafter much better able to understand what they find in the news of the day and will have a much clearer knowledge of the world's international affairs from having heard Dr. Anderson's discourse. It occupied something over an hour and a half in delivery and frequently called forth marks of the warm appreciation with which it was listened to.

In reply to several correspondents it may be said that President Kruger is certainly not a Jesuit, but has been noted for his illiberality toward the Roman Catholic faith and persons adhering thereto. He was seventy five years of age on the day the famous ultimatum was issued, 10th October last.

Kruger now says his total fighting strength is no more than forty thousand men. If he tells the truth, which is doubtful, his losses in killed, wounded, prisoners and deserters amount to one half the force with which the Boers began the war. As the Free Staters are now returning to their farms in large numbers the decrease of the Dutch forces is now going on more rapidly than ever before.

The principal business before the Newfoundland Legislature was the renewal of the modus vivendi on the French Shore question. Just as this important question came up Mr. Bond created general surprise by moving an amendment that the House had no confidence in the Governor's advisers. After an adjournment it was thought a majority for the Government had been secured, but four members deserted and the amendment was carried by 15 to 9. Fortunately this did not prevent the modus vivendi bill passing. Apparently the new Government formed by Mr. Bond is not less loyal than that led by Sir James Winter.

An exchange tells that: "Bishop Turner, who has been entertained by members of the royal family in England, breakfasted with Gladstone, was the honored guest of the Queen of Spain, and has travelled in many foreign countries, was stricken by paralysis while performing his duties at Savannah. His fellow-Christians in Georgia refused to grant this eminent man who was helpless from disease, permission to ride in a sleeping car from Savannah to Atlanta, because he was born a negro! Without a murmur Bishop Turner allowed himself to be carried into the fifty car set aside for his race. With the patience of a noble soul he submitted to the insult imposed upon him by the heartless representatives of a Caucasian superiority."

Another big "trek" of the Boers is expected to follow the making of peace and the absorption of the Republics into British territory. They do not want to go further north as the country is too hot. It is feared by the Germans that there may be a very large immigration into German South West Africa which lies northward of the Orange River and between British Bushuanaland and the Atlantic coast. Already the Germans in this reign have memorialised the Berlin Government to increase the military forces there, and to do so before the Boer migration begins, lest they may come in such numbers as to take practical control of the country. This is one of the straws which show how the wind is blowing and it gives a glimpse of the unfavorable opinion of the Boers already formed by the German colonists in South Africa.

LAST evening Mr. J. A. McLaren received a letter from Mr. James Paton in which he states that he intends leaving Liverpool on the 31st. The letter is dated March 7th and in it he states that he was present and witnessed the Queen's visit to London and that he had the honor of lifting his hat to the "good old lady"... Millions lined the streets and joined for miles in singing Rule Britannia and God Save the Queen.

THE building operations to be carried on in Sydney during the coming summer will, it is said, materially effect the price of lumber in Prince Edward Island. In referring to the increase in price and exchange says:--American buyers are making inquiries as to the cut for next season. Prices are much advancing, in fact the highest for the past ten years. There is a growing demand for hardwoods from Western Ontario and English buyers, particularly for maple and spruce. Germany is also enquiring about Canadian hardwood. On this account a boom has struck all the mills throughout Canada.
