Leader Sends A Rousing Message

The Guardian has received the following encouraging communication from Hon. R. B. Bennett, Conservative Leader:

OTTAWA, July 18, 1930.—"In the past five weeks I have visited every Province of this Dominion and for the generous welcome of each one of them I am most deeply grateful.

Device For Submarine Rescues

CARTAGENA, Spain, July 22.—An automatic device for rescuing persons from submerged submarines was given official Government tests here yesterday. Capt. Arturo Genova, inventor of the device, a Quarter Master and a sailor, participated in the tests. Leaving the submarines E-3 several times, while the craft was submerged at a depth of about 150 feet, they reached the surface safely each time.

The inventor claimed the apparatus could also be used to lower persons into submarines. The apparatus is raised automatically by a buoy and then returns to the submarines. It can make a trip every ten or fifteen minutes.

Premier King's 'New Department'

OTTAWA, Ont., July 22.—Officials here were reticent with regard to a despatch quoting the New York World to the effect that the Canadian National Railways would shortly embark upon a new field of activity and link up the Ireland Services with air routes. It is known that both Railways have had this under consideration for some time, but whether the C. N. R. and C. P. R. will undertake joint services or not is unknown. Some hint of possibilities in aviation expansion was conveyed here last night, when the Prime Minister, addressing a campaign meeting reassured those civil servants whose positions were threatened by the transfer of the natural resources to the western provinces that the Government was contemplating the establishment of a new Department, embracing aviation and radio. This, he said might be known as the Department of Communications. What connection if any there might be between the two announcements that of the Prime Minister and the New York World despatch could not be definitely established today.

King Govt. Already Defeated

Bennett Scores "Returned Man From South Of The Line"—"Hysterical Convert's" Scheme To Catch Votes.

TORONTO, Ont., July 22.—"Canada within the Empire," and emphatic declarations that the Liberal Government was already defeated, were the ringing notes sounded by Hon. R. B. Bennett, here today at a luncheon of Toronto Conservatives.

Canadian ensigns and the Union Jack were in evidence at the tables in the crowded ballroom where the Conservative Chieftain spoke. Toronto professional and business men, with a large attendance of women, heard the words of the Opposition Leader, for statements of Premier King on Empire trade, Mr. Bennett had sharp references. "Why," he asked, "this new born faith, this death bed repentance, this desire for forgiveness on the part of the returning of the prodigal. The man who talks so glibly now of Empire and the flag. The Prime Minister was trying to "catch votes" on this matter and was speaking with the "hysteria of a convert," and talking of his new-born faith in Great Britain. Mr.

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Indifferent Mr. King

Government statistics showing the decline in Canada's trade and Hansard reports of debates in the House of Commons together show that the Mackenzie King government has had ample warning of the condition to which many Canadian industries have been brought by government indifference to their welfare.

THE DAIRY INDUSTRY

Protests by the National Dairy Council, by Conservative members, by farmers generally against the New Zealand butter preference have gone unheeded by the Government. Canadian butter exports dropped by over \$8,000,000 in the last five years. Imports rose from almost nothing to close on \$15,000,000. In 1928 the number of dairy cows decreased by 110,000. Cheese exports dropped by 15,500,000 in the past five years.

These figures are gathered by government departments. Mackenzie King had them. Was he concerned with the state of affairs? He did nothing to stop it. He was indifferent.

THE PORK AND BACON INDUSTRY

Because the dairy industry was depressed and fewer cows were milked the pig raisers also suffered, for skimmed milk is the chief food of farm raised pigs.

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Ontario Going Almost Solidly For Mr. Bennett

Change Of Govt. Certain If Ontario Indications Count For Anything—Observers State That Conservatives Will Carry More Than Seventy of Eighty-Two Ont. Seats.

TORONTO, Ont., July 21.—The wave of electoral sentiment against the King Government is assuming tidal proportions in Ontario. This Province undoubtedly is going almost solidly for Hon. R. B. Bennett. Not only politicians, but business men and others not associated with politics, arriving in Toronto over the week end from all points of the Province, had only one story to tell, that a change of government was certain if Ontario indications counted for anything. Ontario people, they report, are turning to Mr. Bennett and his policies as the instruments for restoring economic well being in the country. Seats in the province which were regarded at the beginning of the campaign as safe for the Government are now being placed in

The Conservatives column. Old Liberal strongholds, it is said, are preparing to fall.

WILL GO WITH TIDE

The whole four Ontario Cabinet Ministers are in danger and one or two of them are almost certain to be defeated. Hon. W. D. Euler, Minister of Revenue is likely to be left at home in North Waterloo, despite the fact that he has his own press to support him and has claims on the constituency. All reports are to the effect that the fight is going against him, the reason being that his constituency, which is largely industrial, is concerned with the economic issues of the campaign. Hon. J. Approves Bennett's Pensions Policy

Liberal Supporter At Georgetown Voices Approval Of Conservative Old Age Pensions Policy. Hon. John A. MacDonald Given Splendid Reception.

The political meeting at Georgetown Monday night was very largely attended, the Conservative candidate, Hon. John A. MacDonald, receiving an enthusiastic ovation.

Hon. Dr. Grant, Liberal candidate, was the first speaker. His address was largely a repetition of his previous platform statements.

Hon. Mr. MacDonald dealt fully with the fiscal record of the King Government and with other matters of vital interest in the campaign. He

was followed by Premier Lea, for the Liberal candidate and by Hon. J. D. Stewart, who dealt trenchantly with old age pensions, the Conservative highway policy, and the subsidy question.

Senator Hughes, the last speaker, expressed approval of the Conservative policy with regard to old age pensions.

Mr. James J. Condon presided impartially.

Budget Camouflage

Hon. Mr. Dunning in his budget speech (Unrevised Hansard, 1930, page 1711) "When the revision is completed the Canadian customs tariff will consist of 1188 items of which 589 will be free under British preference."

Here is how Mr. Dunning made the "preferential" list of which he is so proud: Item No. 448 on the old tariff (Agricultural Implements) is now split up into cultivators, harrows, etc.; mowing machines, etc.; spraying and dusting machines; hay loaders, hay tedders; incubators and brooders; fanning mills, peaviners; electric power equipment for farm purposes only. Each of these is now a separate item with its own number. SEVEN ITEMS NOW WHERE THERE WAS BUT ONE BEFORE.

And hundreds of the products on the preferential list have never been imported to Canada from Britain and never will be. Fruits and vegetables such as are produced abundantly in Canada are to be let in free.
