PROGRESS OF JAPAN.

Japan set up postal savings banks about 25 years ago and in the first year the total of deposits was 15,234 yen—the yen being about 80 cents. In seven years the deposits reached the million mark and by steady growth since have now reach 23,423,000 yen. The people have learned to save and by the growth of industries and the steady advance in wages are better able to save than they were before. In most lines wages have advanced 50 per cent and in some lines have doubled within the past five or six years.

In railways Japan has made noteworthy progress. The first railway, 18 miles in length from Yokohama to Tokio was built in 1872. Now the State railways have grown to 822 miles in length and the private railways to 2,802 miles, a total of 3,624 miles. The postal service has also developed till there are 4,408 postoffices in Japan and the postal routes cover 60,000 miles. The telephone came in later than other modern improvements. In 1891 there were but 18 telephone offices open to the public and now there are four times as many. There are now 1,450 telegraph offices in Japan with 63,000 miles of wire.

The foreign trade of the country shows a vast increase in the past twelve years. It was in the year 1888 that the aggregate of imports and exports first reached 100 million yen (\$50,000,000). It has since developed by leaps and bounds until last year the total was \$245,500,000. The imports now largely exceed the exports. In the meantime there has been a great development of the science of government, of general intelligence, and the army and navy of Japan are for their size thought to be quite as efficient as those of average European countries.

There are conflicting accounts with regard to the dispute between France and Turkey. It appears, however, that on the despatch of the French squadron the Sultan sent renewed promises of payment. These the French Government declined to accept as previous promises to the same effect had been repeatedly broken, and insisted upon material guarantees of the Sultan's good faith. These not being forthcoming it is said the French ships yesterday seized the island of Mitylene (ancient Lesbos) which lies near the coast of Asia Minor. It has an area of 618 square miles, or something less than one third of the area of P. E. Island and a population of about 40,000. This action is expected to enforce prompt payment of the French demands.

St. John is rejoicing in the promise of a large shipping business for its port during the coming winter. The C. P. R. terminus on the western side of the harbor will be the terminal of the Allan Line under the new mail contract with the Government; the Elder-Dempster Company will run a fortnightly service from there to Liverpool, the Donaldsons a similar service to Glasgow, the Manchester liners a fortnightly service to Manchester, and the Head Line a fortnightly service to Dublin and Belfast. The Franco-Canadian Line are also debating whether they will sail from this port, and as the Furness Line steamers sail from St. John via Halifax, the Canadian Pacific Railway is building covered cattle yards capable of holding 1,800 head, extending its sidings, and laying down additional tracks, while the Dominion Government has completed a large Immigration shed with sleeping and eating accommodation for 1,200 persons.

UNCARED FOR CHILDREN.

The other day in discussing the case of boys trained in the school of the street we omitted to mention the fact that five of this class are now in the jail in this city awaiting trial for serious offences. All are under sixteen years of age. This is a part of the harvest from seed that is being sown from day to day and from bad conditions that have long existed in our midst. Surely there is need for something being done. This Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock in the Y. M. C. A. parlor a public meeting will be held for discussing the ways and means of establishing a Home for the protection and education of uncared for children. There should be a full attendance.

Prevention is always better than cure and a home of the sort contemplated might be the instrument of great usefulness. Had there been such a home in existence for years past it might perhaps and probably would have saved from their present hard lot and harder prospects some at least of the boys now shut up in the jail. There would be less need of a reformatory now,—a need that is sadly felt—if the street walls had been cared for in time. We most heartily commend the new movement, which, if judiciously organized and supported may accomplish great good.

THE MILLINERY LEADERS.

Michelman Term Supreme Court.

TUESDAY, Nov. 5th. The following judgements were delivered:—In the case of Margaret Miller, widow of the late Daniel Miller vs John Newson which was brought to recover compensation under the Tenants Compensation Act for improvements erected on the property at Rocky Point under lease to her late husband and since his death the lease extended to her as administratrix Mr. W. E. Bentley and D. C. McLeod, K. C. for plaintiff and W. S. Stewart, K. C. for defendant. Judgement for plaintiff giving \$840.00 compensation. As this was the first case of the kind brought before this Court a good deal of interest attached to the argument and judgement. Counsel for defendant argued that as Mrs. Miller had taken out the new lease in her own name she held it in her personal capacity and not as administratrix and therefore the notice to quit given by the defendant being given after the expiry of the original lease was too late to bring the case under the statute. The Court thought ruled that it was utterly impossible for her to hold in any other capacity than as administratrix and gave their judgement accordingly. McPherson vs McLeod, a trespass case in which a verdict had been given for plaintiff and a rule for a new trial applied for, the Judges reserved their decision to give counsel an opportunity to argue the point as to liability of the defendant as owner of cattle which had committed certain trespasses for which damages were sought to be obtained—the argument to take place at a later date during this term. W. S. Stewart, K. C. for plaintiff, W. A. O. Morson, K. C. for defendant. In the case of Compton vs Cannon the rule for a new trial was refused. Messrs W. B. Ross, Austin L. Fraser and J. D. Reginald Stewart upon application read by the Attorney-General were called to the Bar as barristers. Mr. A. E. Hogan was admitted as an Attorney of the Court upon application, read by Mr. W. S. Stewart, K. C.
