After preliminary business and some discussion the following resolution was submitted: Moved by N. Rattenbury, seconded by Hon. G. E. Hughes, That the President, Vice President and Mr. Bentley be a committee to wait on our Federal representatives and impress upon them the importance of having a Marconi station at or near Charlottetown, instead of at Cape Bear as at present. This resolution passed unanimously, and it was further ordered that the same committee, with Mr. Rattenbury added to it, be authorized to prepare data relative to our transportation rates, etc. and supply to the representatives such special information about rates, etc. as will be of benefit to the interests of this province. The discussion was of the conversational description. It was strongly contended that P. E. I. does not get fair play and that the I. C. R. ought to take over the whole transportation service charges and night telegraph rates were also referred to and hope was expressed that concessions to the public will be made in the near future. Better arrangements for the supply of information respecting P. E. Island connections to passengers at mainland points during winter, and for the thorough checking of passengers' baggage by way of Pictou, were also briefly discussed. The danger and loss attendant upon the sending of winter steamers upon special services to distant points, such as Hudson Bay and Newfoundland, were referred to before the meeting adjourned.
