SILVER FOX BREEDERS

prices had declined alarmingly and demand for pelts had lessened.

There was also very virulent outbreaks of distemper which took up a great deal of the attention of the members and necessitated the importation by the Provincial Government of some 25,000 treatments of Fromm's distemperoid vaccine, which were administered by Dr. George Bishop and the staff of the provincial laboratory.

Notwithstanding the imminence of distemper, the provincial live fox show at Charlottetown was held in November and no trouble resulted therefrom. The attend-

ance of visitors was excellent and the show was well up to the standard.

The Association's pet show was staged at Summerside early in January and had 1,085 entries, which was a new record. The live fox show was judged by George A. Callbeck and the pet show by Provincial fox grader Douglas Bell.

Because of the low prices prevailing for fox pelts and the decline in demand the officers of this Association collaborated with those of the Canadian National Fox Breeders' Association and others in urging the Federal Minister of Agriculture to place in operation the Marketing Act. This was finalized and a schedule of prices drawn up and advances made to shippers of 80 per cent of the allotted values.

On the conclusion of this report, president MacMillan was heartily congratulated on the result of his year's work.

The financial statement was read by secretary W.R. Shaw and showed that the Association was in a healthy position.

Reports On Distemper

D. O. Stewart of Summerside reported on the activities of a committee set up to deal with a distemper situation which had existed there to a limited extent. A questionnaire was compiled, asking for information on the health, numbers and other particulars of foxes in the ranch and as to whether the rancher would be willing to have his foxes inoculated and also if he would be willing to contribute the sum of 50 cents per fox as of January 1, 1947, to a fund, having as its object the purchase and destruction of any foxes suffering from distemper.

Fifty ranches were visited by Dr. Will Wood and his brother, Joe Wood, and all were most cooperative. Twenty-six with a total of 2,987 foxes and fox pups agreed to have their foxes inoculated and owners representing 1,680 foxes offered to subscribe \$830, being 50 cents per fox as of Jan. 1, 1947, towards the fund for the destruction of foxes suffering from distemper and their replacement with other foxes or a cash payment.

This was considered very satisfactory by all present and Mr. Stewart stated that if there seemed to be any distemper difficulty in other parts of the Province a

similar procedure would be adopted.

The expense bill in connection with the questionnaire amounted to the small sum of \$68 and secretary Shaw was instructed to pay this from a grant of \$500 set aside at an executive meeting recently for situations such as the above.

It was decided to have published the names of the committee which is functioning in Summerside in connection with these control measures. They are: Chairman, L. W. Hancock, Lloyd Lockerby, Robert Humphrey, Andrew Jardine and Ernest T. Mill.

Secretary Shaw reported that he had written Fromm Bros., stating that a reduction in the price of distemperoid virus to 50 cents per fox dose would be much appreciated here and lead to a wider use of it. Later they wrote Dr. Bishop, stating they would reduce the price to 60 cents, providing 8,000 doses were contracted for. Should this be done, Mr. Shaw said, it would mean that the rancher would pay in the vicinity of 90 cents per fox for each inoculation.

Directors Elected

The election of directors was then held and the following new directors were appointed:

For Queen's, J. H. McPhail and Ernest Cudmore; for Prince, D. O. Stewart and Roy Woodside; for King's, E. Burling and S. Johnston.

Miss Grace Diamond was appointed auditor.

The directors for Canadian National were not appointed as its annual meeting would be held in Charlottetown in June and the appointments would be made then.

A committee, consisting of Col. D. A. MacKinnon, secretary W.R. Shaw, Ernest Cudmore and B. G. Rogers, was appointed to make arrangements for the entertainment of visiting foxmen from all over Canada to the Canadian National Fox Breeders' Association annual meeting which will be held at the Charlottetown Hotel June 16 and 17.

Lowell W. Hancock then presented an amendment to the constitution which suggested that, in view of the fact that mink breeding is now being carried on, with several new types being brought in in recent years, it would be in order to change the name of the Association to include other fur animals besides silver fox. It was finally decided to ask the Provincial Legislature at its next session to substitute Prince Edward Island Fur Pro-

ducers' Association for the present title of the Silver Fox Breeders' and Exhibitors' Association.

D. O. Stewart moved a vote of thanks to the Provincial Department of Agriculture for its hearty co-operation in the control of distemper and in all measures in which the fox breeders had requested assistance and support. He also asked the secretary to write Federal Minister of Agriculture Hon. Mr. Gardiner, his deputy, Dr. H. Barton, and the director of marketing, A.M. Shaw, thanking them for their great assistance in placing the Marketing Act in operation for the fox breeders.

French Feature Silver Fox

George A. Callbeck was called on for some remarks and he said that there was no question but that fox pelts were being moved with considerable difficulty and at low prices but there was some hope of improvement as French designers were featuring silver fox and if their style trends caught on the pelts now on hand could be marketed.

Col. D. A. MacKinnon said that in the United States there had been quite a bit of interest taken recently in fox furs for trimming. This was due to the removal of a 20 per cent tax on fox furs used for trimming ladies' coats. The prices were low but if the trend continued the quantities on the American market could be disposed of before fall. He said it was very regrettable that Hon. Mr. Abbott, Minister of Finance, did not heed the request of the ranchers to remove the processing tax of 10 per cent and the sales tax of eight per cent which, when the garment was sold, really amounted to 25 per cent. Had the tax been removed fox furs would be selling freely in Canada and the outlook would be very much brighter.

He also criticized the placing of Canadian currency on par with that of the United States, saying that "we should have followed the example of the British and kept our money at a lower rate than the Americans, which would encourage exports and discourage imports."

As a result of changes in tariff and Canadian money being at par, an American now has to pay 37 1/2 per cent when he purchases furs in Canada, as against 25 per cent about a year ago. Col. MacKinnon moved that the secretary be authorized to write Hon. D. C. Abbott, Minister of Finance, requesting that the processing and sales tax be removed from ranch furs and giving reasons why this should be done. The motion was unanimously passed. At a meeting of directors, held subsequent to the annual meeting, the following officers were appointed for the ensuing year: President: Lloyd Lockerby, Summerside. Vice-president: J. Heber MacPhail, Cornwall. Secretary-treasurer: W.R. Shaw, Charlottetown. Executive committee: Col. D.A. MacKinnon, Charlottetown; Gordon MacMillan, Cornwall; R. S. Humphrey, Kensington; D. O. Stewart, Summerside.

CLUB SHOWS UP LADIES' FAULTS

How do you rate with your women's club? Those members who become presidents and chairmen and direct important drives usually have to learn to lick some common feminine faults. So veteran clubwomen say.

ARE CRYSTAL SET RADIO LAWS GOOD ENOUGH FOR CANADIANS?



Canada's radio laws date back to the early days when radio "pioneers" would tremble with excitement when the "cat's whisker" picked up some squeaks on their crystal sets. Today Canadian listeners can hear a quiet voice speaking from the other side of the world. Radio has come a long way. But Canada's radio laws have not kept pace.

To take one example—there is no legal right to freedom of speech on the air in Canada. As matters stand, any "government-of-the-day" could prevent expression by radio of any opinion other than its own. Obviously, no one of the governments responsible for various Acts or regulations had this intention in mind. The situation has arisen simply because the laws were

made from time to time like a patchwork quilt. Many of these laws were passed without any idea of what radio would grow into.

The Independent Commercial Radio Stations of Canada believe the Canadian radio listener will take a lively interest in the suggestion that Canada's radio laws should be overhauled. Radio broadcasting in Canada is something which affects every home. It is important to you and to your children that Canadian radio should be free from the restrictions of "Crystal Set" radio laws.
