Leafs Defeat Chicago 4-1 For Second Place; Habs, Bruins 2-All

CHICAGO, Dec. 8 — (CP) — Toronto Maple Leafs went into second place in the National Hockey League tonight by handing the Chicago Black Hawks a 4-1 beating before 11,563 fans. It was the Hawks fourth successive loss, dropping them into a last-place tie.

Vic Lynn's two second-period goals gave the Leafs a well-merited prohibitive margin which they held to the finish.

It was a game in which referee Butch Keeling gave out 12 penalties, including two majors to Doug McCaig of Chicago and Garth Bosch of the Leafs for a third-period fight.

Oma Backs Out, Says Louis Playing Too Rough

 NEW YORK, Dec. 8 — (AP) — Joe Louis is fighting "real fights and throwing bombs," said manager Tex Sullivan today, and he promptly pulled his heavyweight contender, Lee Oma, out of a scheduled exhibition with the retired champion.

"Exhibitions, nuts!" shrieked Sullivan. "They're not exhibitions, they're real wars. Look what happened to Pat Valentino in Chicago last night. Louis busted him up and knocked him out in eight rounds."

"Valentino said Louis is a much better fighter than Ezzard Charles (the National Boxing Association champion). He hits harder. People are wondering whether Louis will make a comeback. Take it from me, he's already come back."

"That guy is in there throwing bombs. Look what he did to Johnny Shkor in Boston and Johnny Flynn in Kansas City. They were fights, not exhibitions."

"And ask any heavyweight what's the difference between eight-ounce gloves and 10-ounce gloves when big guys fight. They'll tell you—none."

"If we meet Louis, let's advertise it as a real fight, for that's what it will be. Then we can make some big money instead of \$28,000 gates like in Chicago. I'll guarantee Louis 35 per cent of a \$100,000 gate if he'll take on Oma in Buffalo."

Oma, the erratic playboy batter was slated to go 10 rounds with the Brown Bomber in a no-decision exhibition in Detroit next Wednesday.

Louis, about to board a train in Chicago for Detroit late this afternoon, said:

"I figured he'd do that when he learned of the Valentino knockout."

The Bomber, did not elaborate.

Hockey School To Open Here Tonight; 50 Students Expected

The second annual Hockey Coaches and Referees' School will get underway at the Charlottetown Hotel tonight at 8:15 following the arrival in the City this afternoon of Mr. George Hayes of the National Hockey League refereeing staff, who will be the chief instructor at this year's School.

Mr. Hayes, who will arrive by plane from Montreal where he officiated at the Boston-Montreal game last night, is an experienced and competent instructor and has already conducted some four or five hockey schools under the auspices of the N.H.L. this season. He will open the School tonight with a talk on "Hockey Rules and Refereeing" which will be followed by an open question period.

Assisting Mr. Hayes on the instructional work during the three-day school, which is under the sponsorship of the Department of Physical Fitness, will be Murph Chamberlain, former N.H.L. playing star and present coach of the Sydney Millionaires of the Cape Breton Senior Hockey League, who will arrive here from Sydney on Saturday morning, accompanied by the manager of the Sydney Forum, Mr. Chamberlain's first session in connection with the school will be held at two o'clock on Saturday afternoon at the Charlottetown when he will give a "blackboard talk" on the "Fundamental skills of playing hockey."

Some 50 students are expected to attend the School and will include representatives from all points in the Province as well as from Saint John and Moncton, N.B., Halifax,
