Mr. Nicholson has met with such success this year in this venture that he intends going more extensively into it next year. His present crop consists of about four thousand pounds, which was grown upon 2 1/2 acres of land. When proper facilities are procured here for the curing of tobacco leaf there will be no reason why Island-grown tobacco should not lead the market in Canada. Experts from Ottawa say we have an ideal climate and soil for this plant.—Exe.
