Catherine MacKinnon was born at Nau Frauge, Prince Edward Island, May 18, 1831. She was the daughter of John MacKinnon, Nau Frauge. She was married February 5, 1860 to Capt. Roderick MacDonald of Little Pond. The family moved to California on Jan. 4, 1874 and lived in Livermore Valley. The family moved to Washington on November 14, 1882, and settled in Pomeroy. Captain MacDonald died May 26, 1889, in Pomeroy. In September 1904 Mrs. MacDonald went to live with her daughter Mrs. Ludgate at Farmington. In 1912 they all moved to Tekoa and lived in Tekoa till her death. She died January 29, 1918 in Tekoa and was buried in Pomeroy, Jan. 31, 1918, beside her husband. She leaves one brother, Hugh MacKinnon, living at Selkirk, Prince Edward Island, and two daughters and two grand children to mourn their loss. Mrs. MacDonald was of strong constitution fine physique, a splendid specimen of the pioneer woman and her many P. E. Island friends will be grieved to hear of her death.

The death occurred at Kelly's Cross, on Wednesday, Feb. 20th of Mary, beloved wife of Mr. John Haughey in the 63rd year of her age. The deceased, who before her marriage was a daughter of the late Mr. Francis Malone had been for the past year or two in declining health, a sure result of the hard work, and worries, and family burdens incident to most farmers' lives and homes, and the deceased always did her end of the business in truly worthy and Christian manner. Fortified by the last rites of the Catholic Church by her pastor Rev. Dr. Curran, she calmly expired at 5 o'clock on the morning of the 20th amidst the tears and prayers of her sorrowing husband and children. Her funeral took place to Kelly's Cross Church on Friday 22nd, where a Requiem High Mass was sung by the pastor, after which her remains were laid to rest in the adjoining cemetery.
