**Prices Firm On New York Stock Exchange**  
NEW YORK, April 17—(AP)—Sale of a \$1,000,000 block of Chrysler stock for cash highlighted Saturday's market.  
The market generally began to rise after a wobbly start and final prices in many cases were the best of the day. Demand for oil issues, with gains of more than a point and some at top prices for the year, provided the power for the improvement.  
The Chrysler sale was 19,822 shares at 50 1/4, or a total of \$9,961,055.50. The price represented an advance of 1-4 point above Thursday's close. Chrysler finished 1-3-4 ahead at 51 7-8.  
Brokerage houses reported that the stock was sold by Canadian investors who feared the effect of an anticipated increase in the par value of Chrysler to \$25 a share from \$5. Stockholders will meet Tuesday to decide the matter.  
One broker said that Canadian law treats an increase in par value as an increase in income, which is not the case in the United States.  
Selling of Chrysler by Canadian holders has been heavy all week and has pushed the price down to the 1948-49 low of 50.

**Norwegians Fear Whaling Industry May Be Vanishing**

OSLO, April 18 — (AP) — Norway has turned whaling into a costly scientific industry with a payoff of \$60,000,000 a year. She has over \$50,000,000 tied up in floating factories that sail each winter to the Antarctic and return in the Antarctic with 160,000 metric tons of whale oil plus refrigerated steaks.  
In the brief hunting season allowed by international agreement — 3 1/2 months — Norwegians cut up and boil down more than 12,000 whales.  
This country controls a majority interest in global whaling, with 10 floating factories as against eight owned by the rest of the world. But the No. 1 position is logical for Norway. A Norwegian named Sven Foyn revolutionized whaling.  
Back in 1868, Foyn invented a gun which fired a grapple with an explosive head. Instead of being annoyed by hand-thrown harpoons, whales began to be blasted into eternity in a few seconds by this Norwegian artillery.  
With the best whaling far off in the Antarctic, Norwegian shipwrights invented the floating factory. It carries a squadron of catcher boats, all mounting harpoon-guns. It also has machinery for reducing the whales, which the boats bring in, to their last drop of oil.  
Before the war, both Japan and Germany tried in vain to overtake Norway in whaling. Now Germany has no floating factories left, while Japan has put two into service again. Britain has four, The Netherlands one, and the Soviet Union one.  
Norway is miffed at the United States for allowing the Japanese to get back into the business, and was shocked when some surplus tried to get money from the European Recovery Program for new Germany floating factories.  
Norway's Arguments  
The Norwegian argument is that her whaling fleet is already large enough to catch alone all the whales allowed by law, so E.R.P. financing of German floating factories would be sheer economic waste. The painful surprise is that whaling as a result of its super-modernization may be vanishing industry, as was hunting buffalo on the American plains.  
H.T. Knudtson, the Norwegian government's whaling expert says that the blue whale, biggest animal in the world and basis of the business, may be dangerously nearing extinction.  
This greatest of the leviathans is blue on his back, blue-grey on his belly, weighs up to 100 tons and may be as long as 100 feet. On a floating factory he becomes 18 tons or more of oil.  
An international pact sets the world catch at 16,000 blue-whale units a year. A blue whale is counted as equalling two fin whales are caught than blue whales.  
"We had hoped suspension of hunting during the war would permit blue whales to increase substantially," says Knudtson. "But it hasn't. A little more international co-operation would help. The truth is that whale production could be boosted now and fewer whales killed, if whaling powers adopted a rational schedule for hunting."  
"The thing to do is to hunt later in the season when the whales are fatter. A blue whale that affords only 86 barrels of oil in December would have given 160 barrels if left alive until March."

**Imperial Oil Co. Reports Record Year**  
TORONTO, April 18—(CP)—Imperial Oil Ltd., had net income in 1948 of \$22,832,070 or 84.18 cents a share, compared with \$20,464,381 or 75.64 cents a share in 1947.  
During 1948, says the annual report, the company "found more crude oil, produced more oil, transported, refined, distributed and marketed more oil and products than ever before." Nevertheless, "Total net operating profit expressed as a percentage of total dollar sales shows a decrease from 6.10 per cent in 1947 to 4.90 per cent in 1948. Expressed in terms of volume the net profit is 93-100 of one cent a gallon in 1948 compared with 96-100 to one cent a gallon in 1947."  
Sales in Canada and Newfoundland reached a new high of 1,819,000,000 gallons. Gross value of sales was \$444,373,320 and net profit on Canadian operations was \$16,873,163, or 62.21 cents a share, compared with \$15,903,895 or 58.71 cents a share in 1947.  
Capital expenditures for plant and equipment totalled \$36,591,937 up \$9,371,933 from 1947.  
Dividends paid amounted to \$13,545,295, and the balance of profits was invested in the business.  
Altogether, funds brought into the business during the year amounted to \$71,260,588, including proceeds from an issue of debentures, from sale of holdings in International Petroleum Co., Ltd., and other investments.  
Sale of International Petroleum brought \$80,299,248, of which \$38,390,004 was in cash and \$41,909,344 in interest-bearing notes.  
During the year inventory of crude oil and products increased from \$59,147,727 to \$79,129,532. An amount of \$3,300,000 was deducted from 1948 earnings and added to inventory reserves bringing reserve for future shrinkage of inventory values up to \$10,000,000.  
This was considered prudent, the report states, in view of some weaknesses which have developed in prices.  
Current assets were \$147,509,730 and current liabilities \$36,933,829, resulting in net working capital of \$110,575,901, an increase of \$43,411,110 over 1947.
