OXFORD, N. S.

A MEETING of the Institute of Lots 27 and 28 was held in Cape Traverse Hall, on the 26th inst, at 7 p. m. There was a very good attendance of the intelligent farmers of this fine section, but owing to the extreme cold, a very few of the residents of the adjacent districts were present. Pres. G. W. Cameron occupied the chair, and spoke briefly on the work of the Institute during the past year, stating that it was very much against his wish that he held the office of president this year. However it was not the president but the members who would make the Institute a success or failure; and thanking them for their co-operation in the past he would ask them to do all they possibly could this year also. Prof Ross gave a short talk on the benefit of selling the manufactured products of the farm via, beef, butter, and pork instead of hay, oats, etc. He said the dairy cow should be given all she would eat of good succulent feed, as she was simply a machine that would convert it into milk. He then with a stereopticon threw upon the screen pictures of the different dairy breeds, showing the good points of the best producers, also a few of the best cattle, and explaining the difference between beef and the dairy breeds. After a short intermission during which a large number paid the mem. fee for the current year, the professor invited all who wished to ask any questions to do so. W. S. Muttart wanted to know if it was advisable for a dairy farmer who wished to feed some beef to breed part of his herd to a shorthorn sire to raise a few for what purpose? The Prof thought it would be better to have a few shorthorn cows to breed for beef. Another man said he had raised steers from Ayrshire cows and a pure bred shorthorn bull, which at 2 yrs old brought \$51.00 each. The president asked if it would not be better to feed more grain and less tamps to the cattle whether for milk or beef? The Prof. said that he personally was very much in favor of growing and feeding lots of tamps, he did not think there was anything that would take their place especially for young growing stock. A hearty and unanimous vote of thanks moved by B Webster, sec. by W E Gillespie was tendered by the pres. to Prof Ross and suitably acknowledged by him. The meeting then closed. J. E. Howatt, sec.
