**A BAD FIRE**—The firemen had a difficult task before them on Saturday forenoon, when fire broke out in the large double house on Water Street, adjoining the Hotel Lennox, owned by Mr. Frank Mutch. The fire broke out on the East side of the house, occupied by Mr. Mutch, Mr. S. A. McLeod occupying the other side. Citizens were made aware of the fire at 11.15 a. m. by the blowing of the railway whistle. It is explained that the reason why the whistle was blown was because it was found impossible to get "central" on the telephone. Hundreds were attracted to the scene of the fire by the blowing of the whistle and when at last an alarm was got in and the firemen arrived the flames had gained great headway. The fire broke out in the part of the house occupied by Mr. Mutch, starting from a spark from the kitchen flue between two wings at the rear. A strong south wind caused the fire to eat its way between the beams in the south gable and made it very difficult to get at. The firemen after nearly an hour's hard work finally extinguished the last visible sign of flames. The chemical engine was quickly on the scene after the alarm was received and by the use of five of the small sized cylinders doubtless saved Mr. McLeod's end of the house from serious damage. On Mr. Mutch's side the damage from water was quite heavy. The alarm sounded a second time about 1 o'clock for another small outbreak in Mr. McLeod's side of the house. The firemen made a prompt response and quickly extinguished the fire.

**CERTIFICATE OF DEATH**—Mr. George Buxton, Cape Traverse, has received the following from the Military Headquarters, Ottawa, which speaks for itself: "Certified that No. A11113 Private Charlie Benjamin Buxton, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, Canadian Expeditionary Force, has been officially reported as wounded and missing between the 2nd and 4th of June, 1916, and that after full enquiry made, no information has come to hand which would indicate that he is not dead. For official purposes, therefore, his death is presumed to have occurred on or since the last named date. On attestations he gave the name and address of his next of kin as George Buxton (father), Cape Traverse, P. E. I., Sga. W. E. Hodgins, Major General and Adj. General."

**COMING HOME**—Capt. John L. Read and the Canadian crew who took the ice breaker, Mikul Sellanovitch (L. D. Hazen) to Russia, are now on their way home. Capt. Joseph Read, of Summerside received a cable from his son advising he was returning via Vladivostok and Yokohama to Vancouver. Any friends of the crew who wish to communicate with them should immediately wire to Vancouver, care of Ephraim Reat, secretary of the British Columbia Engineering Association. It will be observed by looking at the map that Captain Read and his crew will have made a long trip around the world when they arrive at Vancouver. It was the intention of the Captain to have remained longer in Russia, but the recent upheaval in that country caused him to hasten his departure.
