The fifth annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Floral Associa- tion was held in Dr. Pethick's office, Charlottetown, on Saturday evening the 17th inst. Since its inception this Society has continually sought to increase the interest in the growing of flowers and has suggested and en- couraged the improvement and the beautifying of both public and private grounds in every way possible. The large attendance at Saturday's meet- ing, the report of last year's work, the spirit of progress and optimism which characterized the discussion of plans for the present year, and the energy and enthusiasm manifested by the members present all point to the fact that the Floral Association is in a flourishing condition and will en- large and widen its field of usefulness in the future.

Mr. J. A. Clark, the president, in his annual address, gave an excel- lent review of the year's work with practical suggestions for the future.

The report of the secretary-treas- urer, Mr. J. L. Tennant, showed the receipts for 1916 to be \$172.37. Ex- penses in connection with the Flower Show and prizes for the Back Yard Competition amounted to \$31.80. The Floral Association has a balance on hand of 57 cents. The Associa- tion had a membership of eighty-one in 1916.

Some discussion took place regard- ing the Flower Show to be held by the school boys and girls on March 2nd and the work contemplated in connec- tion with the growing of vegetables in vacant lots. The association placed on record its commendation of the work which the boys and girls are doing and its intention to support their efforts in every way possible.

A prize list committee was ap- pointed consisting of Mr. J. A. Clark, Mr. J. D. Stewart, Mr. Jas. Tall, Mr. John Wonnacott, Mr. A. F. Houston and Mr. A. A. Alley. This Committee will meet shortly and the prize lists for 1917 will be issued shortly.

The Lawn Competitions and the Spring Flowering Bulb Competition will be held again this year. It was left to the Prize List Committee to arrange it possible for a rose show, a peony show and shows of any other flowers which are out of season at the time of the annual flower show.

The Backyard Competition will be considerably enlarged this year and is divided into five sections as fol- lows:

Sec. 1: Backyard—All work done by owner or family.  
Sec. 2: Backyard—All work done with assistance of hired help.  
Sec. 3: Kitchen Garden—All work done by owner or family.  
Sec. 4: Kitchen Garden—All work done with assistance of hired help.  
Sec. 5: Children's Garden Plot—Vegetables or flowers or a combina- tion of both.

Liberal prizes are given in each class. The object of these competi- tions is to improve and beautify the back yards of the City and to turn waste spots into places of production.

All of last year's officers were re- elected except that Professor McLean was placed on the executive in place of Professor S. B. McCurdy and Mr. Jas. Brown was appointed assis- tant secretary.
