It is announced that Aguilardo is coming to the United States to lecture.

It is given out that in about three weeks the Marconi lines of wireless telegraphy will be in operation for commercial and press business, and that an extension of the system to more distant parts of the world is expected to follow rapidly.

Mr. Clergue, heard of the great Canadian enterprises located at Sault Ste. Marie, says their mills are now turning out 500 tons of steel rails daily and the demand is so active that they could find a market in Canada for 1,000 tons daily if they could manufacture that quantity.

The Amherst jail seems to be a decidedly leaky affair, judging from a despatch to the Halifax Chronicle which tells that Pat Burke and Albert Tarris, serving a six months sentence in the County Jail for stealing, effected their escape in the night by filling the window guards off. No effort so far has been made to capture them. Aubrey Briggs a juvenile offender in the same cell knew nothing of the escape until morning, when he awoke and found his companions gone. He then decided to follow them and is now quietly sauntering about town.

It is not often that Canada has a destructive cyclone or tornado, but an exception has occurred in the case of Chesterville, Ont., where a few days ago a tornado destroyed five lives, also unroofing many buildings and injuring the crops very seriously, the property damage being estimated at \$200,000.

The threat expressed or implied to close a certain hotel if the prohibitory law is enforced reads like a very silly piece of bluff. There are many prosperous and successful hotels that have no bar attachment. All that is necessary in this case is to stop the illegal rum business and cater to the wants of that numerous class who desire honest board and lodging.

Young King Alphonso, of Spain, is described as so eccentric in his actions that doubts are expressed of his sanity. A cable despatch says his conduct causes the gravest anxiety in official circles. "He seems to combine the depraved tastes of his notorious grandmother with the irresponsibility of his half-imbriec'd father."

In recent years wild musters, brought hither from the west has been distributed extensively along the railway lines and has now obtained a serious foothold which it will be very hard to break. It is a very noxious weed, which once rooted in the soil can only be eradicated by most persistent and united effort. Prudent farmers will make war upon it vigorously whenever it first appears. It will immensely damage any farm that it over spreads, and if its progress in the Island is not stayed it may prove as great a curse as the potato bug, or the hornfly or both together.

Not every one perhaps realises the desirability of placing the postage stamp always at the right, upper corner of the envelope. It ought to be put there always, because that is the right place for it, and for the convenience of the postmaster whose duty it is to deface the stamp before it is sent on its journey. Moreover stamping machines are being now introduced in the large Canadian cities, that are capable of stamping from 50,000 to 60,000 letters an hour. This is done to save time in the despatch of the mails and delivery of letters. But the stamping machine will only handle letters successfully that have the stamp placed in its proper location. Those with the stamp wrongly placed are sorted out and stamped separately by hand. This causes delay as well as increased work.

Prof. Robertson since his return to the west has given out some facts with regard to the progress of manual training in the Maritime Provinces. He tells that at least eight new places in Nova Scotia, will adopt manual training as part of the school course in September. The Local Government has provided a grant of \$800 to any school board that will give a full course in manual training or household science to not less than 100 pupils, or a grant of \$300 where the number is less than 50. The manual training movement is also going ahead in New Brunswick, and the Government has arranged to present a bonus of \$50 to any teacher who gives full instruction on the subject in his school. The New Brunswick Government has also offered to pay half the cost of carrying children to a centralized or consolidated school.

THE ROYAL DIET.

LONDON July 17.—Since his removal to Cowes, the progress of the King has been so rapid that his physicians have ordered a more liberal diet for His Majesty.

TO REBUILD THE CAMPANILE.

ROME, July 17.—The municipal council of Venice has resolved to rebuild the Campanile of St. Mark's and the Sansovino Loggia. It has opened the subscription for this purpose with a vote of 5,000,000 lire. It is estimated that yesterday's collapse caused damage to the amount of 4,000,000 lire.

It is not very long since The Guardian recorded the case of a Chinese laundryman in this city who asked to be taxed \$100 for the privilege of carrying on business here. Of course he desired that a like tax should be imposed on any of his fellow countrymen who might attempt to do business in the city. Just now the city fathers of Toronto proposes to place a tax of \$50 each upon Chinese laundrymen and they object to it. Moreover the philosophical editor of Saturday Night rises to remark that "just why in a free country the sldermen of a city like Toronto should try to chase away a few Mongolians who are working at a small wage, while all the other laborers are on strike for more money than the public can afford to pay them, seems a strange proposition. The missionary societies, who are always passing the plate and endeavoring by hard luck stories and pathetic descriptions to raise a fund to educate the Chinese, either ought to go out of business or the sldermen who wish to tax the life out of these unwelcome guests should be suppressed. There is no better chance to teach the Chinamen than to have them right with us. John's is always willing to go to Sunday school and surreptitiously to get at or hold the hand of the dear lady teacher who is endeavoring to pilot him towards the Christian judgment. John is fond of his Sunday school teacher, he is fond of the fee that he gets for washee; he is willing to be a Christian or a washee-washer, or both as long as there is something in it for John. Is there any reason why we should fine this enterprising purifier of linen fifty dollars a year for being a Mongolian? Are we really concerned about his soul, or are we mostly anxious to prevent him competing on equal terms with the other people who fray our cuffs and destroy our collars and put our shirt out of business? We ought to decide this question at once and act have the churches and the old ladies working at cross purposes—the one raising money to Christianize the heathen, and the other passing by-law pauperizing him and making it impossible for him to live in the same community with those who praise God from Whom all blessings flow."
