Hints for the Motorist

CHOOSING OIL FOR WINTER USE

Cold Resisting Oils Can Be Had And Should Be Used.

When the crank case is filled with thickened lubricant, the oil pump may fail to operate, because such a pump is designed to handle a liquid that will flow into it and fill it positively and promptly and cannot handle a semi solid. Thus lubricant may fail to reach the bearings, especially if there is much sludge in it to traverse until the engine has become hot and there is a distinct possibility of worn or even burned out bearings, resulting from the temporary failure of oil to reach them. Now all this trouble and risk can be minimized by the use of an oil that is an oil that will not lose its fluid properties at the lowest temperature attained by an engine. Many good oils, especially the heavier grades, thicken at Fahrenheit temperatures in the 20's, 30's and even in the 40's and, as those temperatures are higher than those commonly met with, in unwarmed garages, such oils should be used in cars that are stored. On the other hand, satisfactory oils can be obtained, which do not become stiff or at least thicken so at zero Fahrenheit, and they are just suited for winter use in cars kept in cold garages, where the temperature rarely falls to the extreme point.

Fortunately it is an easy matter for the motorist to test out samples of oil and to determine their cold resisting properties, for it is only necessary to place each sample in a bottle and place them out of doors, when the temperature is low, say at zero or slightly above. They should be allowed to thus remain exposed for an hour or two and then each sample is carefully capable of flowing in their bottles should be selected as having a satisfactory oil test and those that will not flow should be rejected, so far as winter service is concerned.

THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, Jan. 7.—A firm feeling continues to prevail in the local market for eggs and prices are fully maintained. There is a good steady demand for supplies for home requirements and a fairly active trade is passing in a joggling way in all grades. The receipts today were 241 cases, as compared with 205 for the same day last week and 99 for the corresponding day last year.

We quote wholesale jobbing prices as follows: New laid eggs \$1.05 to \$1.10. Fall fresh eggs 0.90 to 1.00. Selected C S eggs 0.90 to 1.00. No. 1 C S eggs 0.90 to 1.00. No. 2 C S eggs 0.80 to 0.90.

There were no new developments in the market for dressed poultry today. The demand was steady for most lines and as the requirements were ample to meet all changes, prices were unchanged. Sales of some lots of choice turkeys were made at 52c to 54c per pound and chickens brought from 32c to 38c per pound as to quality. Ducks are somewhat scarce and wanted at 28c to 32c per pound.

We quote wholesale jobbing prices as follows: Good turkeys 53c to 54c. Geese 51c to 52c. Chickens 33c to 34c. Ducks 32c to 38c. Fowls 26c to 32c.

There was no further change in the market for potatoes, prices being firm at the recent advance noted on account of the improved demand and smaller offerings and sales of car lots of Green Mountain and Quebec stock were made at \$1.00 to \$1.20 per bag of 90 lbs. extra and in a wholesale jobbing way a fair trade was done at \$1.75 to \$1.80 per bag of 80 lbs. extra.
