SAVING THE WASTE

In a recent issue we directed attention to a circular issued by Sir George E. Foster, Minister of Trade and Commerce, pointing out the increasing scarcity of material for manufacture of paper and asking that steps be taken in the different cities of Canada for the saving up of waste paper, rags &c., which could be utilized for this purpose.

We note by our late exchanges that in a number of cities the local branches of the Red Cross Society have taken up the matter, the net profits to be handed over to the Red Cross Fund. Amherst, N. S., a much smaller City than Charlottetown and therefore one in which there is less of this material, has taken it up, through the Amherst Branch of the Red Cross Society.

In the City of Charlottetown, as already stated, there are tons of these materials littering homes, offices, stores, gathering dirt and being a nuisance generally or are being burned to get rid of them. This, under present conditions is unpardonable waste.

AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION

THE INVISIBLE BATTLE IN FLAT FLANDERS

Deadly Trench Warfare Amid Wind-mills and Canals—Wonderful Endurance of Trench Fighters

H. Warner-Allen, official British press representative with the French army, writes: It is no easy matter in the flat plains of Flanders to reach the advanced lines. The smallest eminence gives so wide a view that the enemy's look-outs can, on a clear day, spot a motor car many miles away.

Wonderful Barbed Wire Nowhere along the line is war more invisible than in Flanders. A misty, grey line of trees, a ruined farmhouse, a stake or two with tangled barbed wire—that is all there is to show where the enemy is lying.

Occasionally the bare expanse is broken by a good-sized wood. In such flat country the cover given by trees is invaluable. Indeed, the undergrowth of a coppice is a far more powerful defence than the strongest wall of a medieval castle.

To the stranger the only gay thing about the country is the windmills. Right up within the zone of fire they continue to throw up their arms with extravagant gestures to the skies, working away steadily at their daily task, despite the invader, with true Belgian persistence and obstinacy.

Some miles behind the firing line I visited a hospital built at the cost of the wife of a British officer. Here the men who receive immediate attention are nursed until they are able to be sent to the base hospitals. The doctor in charge considered that the position of his hospital ideal since, thanks to motor ambulances, the wounded could be brought down with a minimum of delay and at the same time it was far enough away to give perfect tranquility to the patients and allow the surgeons to operate without the nerve-racking disturbance of big shells bursting near.

At that time he was in charge of a mobile field ambulance, and it was no small gratification to him that now, during trench warfare, he had been able to reduce the mortality to less than 6 per cent. "Yes," he said, "in trench warfare wounds are really more serious than they are in war in the open. The wounds made by grenades and trench mortars are particularly deadly, as the projectiles touch the ground before hitting the man, and therefore infect the wound."

No Room For Deserters The Swiss troops on all their frontiers have been instructed to permit no deserters to pass in the future, no matter from which country they come. This step was taken to avoid diplomatic complications. The Italian government some time ago demanded the extradition of a number of soldiers who had deserted from their regiments and sought an asylum on Swiss soil.

Capital of Portugal Lisbon, the capital of Portugal, has a population of about half a million. Its harbor is one of the finest in the world, and large enough to hold all the mermen of Europe. The greatest earthquake on record occurred at Lisbon when, in 1755, in less than ten minutes, the greater part of the city was made a heap of ruins, and from 20,000 to 40,000 persons killed.

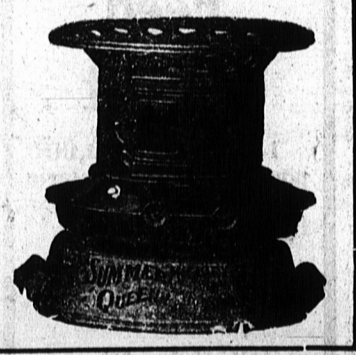
