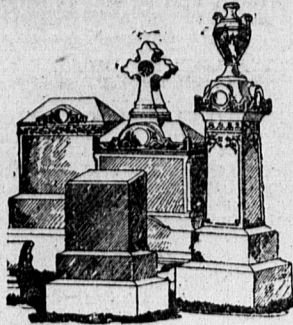


LOOKS LIKE A WRECK ON NEWFOUNDLAND COAST.

Pharmacology and therapeutics, pathology, hygiene and medical jurisprudence, clinical medicine, clinical surgery, obstetrics and bacteriology. He wins honors in clinical medicine and obstetrics.

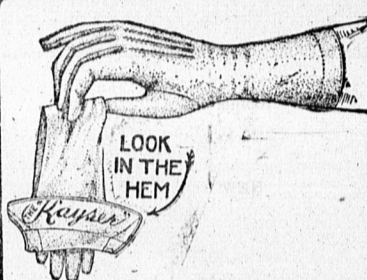

WOMEN LIKE TO KEEP THEIR HATS ON IN CHURCH

MONTREAL, June 10.—Two women passed through the doorway of St. James Methodist Church, Montreal, on Sunday evening without their hats. The other women removed their hats once they were seated in the pews.

"That was the result of Rev. Dr. Sparling's remarks from the pulpit the previous Sunday evening to the effect that it would be much more comfortable and sensible if women would attend church bareheaded on Sunday evenings during the hot weather."

"The verse in the Bible referring to women covering their heads follows: 'Every woman that prayeth or prophesieth with her head uncovered dishonoureth her head for that is even all one as if she were shaven.'—St. Paul, 1st Corinthians, xl, 5."

"That only four women took advantage of this suggestion is attributed by leading members of the church to the fact that St. James Methodist Church during the hot weather is largely a church attended by strangers or occasional adherents. 'Probably,' said one member of the church, 'not half of the people who attended last evening were in the church the week before, when Rev. Dr. Sparling made his announcement.'"

"The majority of members of the church admit that it would be much more comfortable, not only to the women but to the gentlemen, if the ladies did not wear hats, but they say that it is a difficult reform to introduce in church matters."

COUSIN MARRIAGES ARE DANGEROUS

LONDON, June 7.—At a meeting of the Royal Society last week Prof. Karl Pearson presented a paper by S. M. Jacobs on "Inbreeding," with special reference to the marriage of first cousins. A detailed examination of the history of a large number of such marriages showed that whenever an evil factor of the Mendelian recessive type is of fairly common occurrence in a family, a first cousin marriage is not likely to produce

more defective offspring than any other kind of marriage. On the other hand, rare recessive evils which have only occurred in distant generations are far more likely to be developed by a consanguineous marriage. Mr. Jacobs' conclusion was that it was probable that there were many of these rare defects latent in all men and women. The chance of any particular one of these appearing in children of cousin marriage. There were, however, many desirable qualities which might be shown to be recessive, and these were to be expected to recur as well as the evil ones.
