ANOTHER of Springton's land-marks has been removed in the death of Mr. Angus Nicholson, of that place, who died at his home, Saturday, Aug. 11th, at the ripe old age of 81 years, after an illness of six months. His remains were laid in Springton Cemetery on Monday afternoon, there to await the resurrection of the just who die in the Lord. To the bereaved family, friends and relations, the GUARDIAN tenders its sincere sympathy. Mrs. Capt. John Gillis, of this City, is a sister to the deceased.

The water being six or seven feet deep and the young lad being unable to swim, he never came to the surface. A small boy who was on the shore at the time ran away when he saw young Myers jump overboard. John Myers son of Abraham Myers who was not far away came to the rescue, but was too late to save the unfortunate boy. The body was recovered last evening shortly after six o'clock. Much sympathy is felt for the bereaved parents in their hour of sorrow.
