## Big Attendance At The Firemen's Race Meet Sat.

Five Classes Answer The Starter's "Go" On Harbor Ice — Fast Heats Excite Crowd.

The Firemen's Races staged by the Victoria Driving Club drew a very large attendance of spectators on Saturday afternoon. The weather was almost perfect. The program was a long one, consisting of five classes. Some great racing took place, particularly in the free-for-all race and Class A. Trot. In the former, Volo Rico won in straight heats and became the recognized champion pacer, while Briar Mac won the 4th year, maintained his title of champion trotter. The winners were as follows: Volo Rico, Col. D. A. McKinnon; Briar Mac, George Hooper; Leacock, Gordon Hennessey; Syblisset, Alton Burke; Helen Dewey, Claude MacMillan.

Free-For-All—Although won in straight heats by Volo Rico, he had to extend himself to the utmost in each heat. In the first heat he won by half a length, with Major Aubrey and Hush a dead heat for second place. In the second heat Volo Rico won by a neck from Major Aubrey in 29 seconds. In the 3rd heat, Hush and Volo Rico were on even terms, when half way down the course Hush lost a shoe. Volo Rico beat Major Aubrey by nearly a length this heat. Altogether it was one of the most sensational races witnessed on the ice for some years.

Class A. Trot—This was a really great race. The first heat, the three horses were almost abreast at the wire, Briar Mac's nose just being in front. The second heat Johnny Walker trotting great gun for Driver Holmes, won by half a length. The 3rd heat Briar Mac overtook him when within 10 yards from the wire, and won by a heat. The trotting of Kalmuck in this race was greatly admired. Although short of work, he showed that he is a real trotter and beautifully gaited.

Class B. Trot and Pace—This had five starters and was a pretty race to watch. Leacock had the class of the bunch, although closely pressed in the first heat by Mr. Henley, in the 2nd by Ruth S. and in the 3rd by Orolu. All heats were in fast time for the class.

MONCTON, N. B., March 20.—(By the Canadian Press)—The superiority of Quebec over the Maritime Provinces in junior hockey this year was established conclusively here last night when the Montreal Amateur Athletic Association's junior team again outplayed Antigonish, N. S., juniors, this time by a score of 5 to 1, in the second contest of a two-game eastern semi-final in the Memorial Cup playdowns for the junior hockey championship of Canada. As a result of their 4 to 1 victory in the first game here Thursday night, the big red and blue team from Quebec won the round 9 to 2 and became eligible to meet the champions of Ontario this week.

## Island Skater Acknowledged As World Champion

Joseph Arsenault, Wellington, Aged 92, Honored By Montreal A. A. A. — Made Life Member Of Biggest Club.

Mr. Joseph E. Arsenault, of Wellington, and Station Agent of that place for many years, who is ninety-two years of age and a noted skater and step dancer, has received a loving spoon from the Montreal Amateur Athletic Association with the crest of the Association inscribed on it. The spoon was accompanied by a letter from Mr. John J. Louson, congratulating him on his attaining the age of 92 years and still able to challenge any skater over 85 years.

World's Champion

He is acknowledged by the Association as the open amateur skater of the world over 85 years.

His challenge to all comers over 85 years for a distance of three miles has not been accepted.

The letter further stated that Mr. Arsenault's name has been placed on the honor roll of the Association.

The crest on the spoon represents the Association, which is the greatest organization of its kind in the world with a membership of 5,000. The Association recently celebrated its 50th anniversary.

Mr. Arsenault was also the recipient of their magazine, commemorating the Golden Jubilee.

The veteran skater naturally feels very proud of the honour bestowed upon him and says that the title of champion skater of the world is rather a broad statement, but he did not suppose there were many in the world who possess his ability as a skater.

Mr. Arsenault enjoys excellent health and is going to have his picture taken to send to the papers. He is hoping to visit Montreal and shake hands with the officials of the Montreal Amateur Association who sent him the Loving Spoon.—S.

Play-off Positions in N. H. L.

Doubts as to play-off positions in the National Hockey League race ended last night with the single exception of the first place position in the Canadian division. Toronto Maple Leafs still have a chance of topping Montreal Canadiens from the throne.

In the United States division Chicago definitely clinched second place by victory over Boston and Detroit made sure of the third play-off position. Boston Bruins will not appear in the play-offs this year. Rangers had assured themselves of the first place some time ago.

Despite a loss to the Leafs last night, Detroit assumed third place definitely by virtue of Boston's defeat. The Falcons are but two points ahead of Bruins and the "Hub" team can move up on even terms in points, but Falcons have won more games than Boston and would take the play-off position on the strength of that.

The only definite opponents in the play-offs are, at this date, Maroons and Detroit, in a home and home series, total goals to count. Whether Rangers meet Canadiens or Toronto remains indefinite until Tuesday night. Chicago will meet either Canadiens or Toronto for the second place play-off.

Toronto's victory last night gave the team fresh hope of beating out Canadiens. The Leafs come to Montreal Tuesday for the final game of the season. A win or a tie for the champions will keep them on top. A victory for the Leafs will give them a tie with Canadiens in points and also in games won, lost and drawn. The decision would

WINNIPEG, Man., Mar. 20.—Fort William's thundering herd, stampeding along the title trails for the first time in five years, delivered a stunning upset here Saturday night by defeating the world's champion Winnipeggers 1 to 0 in the first of a two-game western semi-final Allan Cup series.

The polished puckmen from Thunder Bay laid down a technically perfect defence to block Winnipeg's drives. A fluke goal early in the second period provided them with a margin they take home for the second series clash Monday night.

Two interesting and exciting games of hockey were played Saturday evening at the Arena. In the first game the Prince of Wales Sisters defeated the Millionaire Sisters by a 2-0 score. Both goals came from the stick of Zilpha Linkletter, speedy P. W. C. centre. The game was characterized by many excellent combination plays by both teams, by clever stick handling and some phenomenal goal tending.

In the second game, the First Year P. W. C. boys defeated a team from Second and Third years by a score of 4-2. The latter team appeared weak on the defensive, although strong on the attack.

Both teams checked heavily throughout the game. Excessive individual playing made the game dragged in spots although interesting to watch.

## Great Struggle Expected Tonight

Maritime And Quebec Champions Ready For The Gong At Montreal. Rangers In Perfect Condition

MONTREAL, Que., March 20.—Montrealers will have their first chance to see Allan Cup hockey this season tomorrow night at the Forum when M. A. A. A.'s Winged Wheelers tackle Rangers of Dalhousie, N. B., in the opening encounter of their two-game Eastern Canada semi-final series. The second game of the round, in which total goals count, will be played Wednesday at the Forum, the winner advancing to meet Toronto Nationals or Ottawa Shamrocks in the Eastern Canada final.

WELL EQUIPPED

M. A. A. A. will enter the game favored locally to score a victory and thus take a lead into the second encounter, but nevertheless the wheelers are expecting a stiff struggle and are by no means overconfident. The Rangers, who have been here since Thursday working out daily, appear to be a fast-skating outfit with plenty of defensive strength, and seem to be well-equipped to give M. A. A. A. stiff opposition. Both teams will be at full strength for the encounter.

Coach "Chuck" O'Connor of the Rangers plans to start McCann in goal with Frank Graham and Bill Walker on the defence, Dud James at centre, and Duke Taylor and Pop Kerr on the wings. This combination will be opposed by Coulter in goal, MacKenzie and Massey on the defence, and the first-string Wheelers front rank of Neville, St. Germain and Delahy. Jotkus, Wilson and Kerr will probably be used by Manager Frank J. Shaughnessy as a substitute front rank and Leback, Gulliver and Butterworth will form the second Dalhousie front line. Tony Baril, who plays both forward and defence, will be the tenth M. A. A. A. man in uniform and Al Taylor will be the other Dalhousie alternate.

The Wheelers first line of Neville, Delahy and St. Germain is being counted on to get M. A. A. A. goals as it has done all season. The Dalhousie team is a well-balanced one and expects it will be able to hold the Wheelers scoring stars in check. Johnny Mitchell of Hamilton has been appointed to referee by vice-President Frank J. Greenleaf, of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association. Goal umpires will be Jim O'Dell and Alex Moore. Jim Foley and Clarry Eblestead will be the timers.

PUTNEY-ON-THAMES, England, March 20.—(A.P.)—The eight oared crew of Cambridge University, rowing strongly and smoothly, swept to victory yesterday over Oxford on the Thames by five full lengths to make it nine straight victories and 43 for the light blues in the century-old series.
