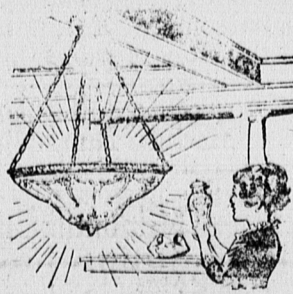

RESOLUTIONS PASSED—At the annual school meeting in Donaldson School District the following resolutions were unanimously approved. Whereas Sec. 43 of The Public School Act, 1920 places an intolerable burden on an already unfairly treated small school district, and whereas, The difference in the compulsory supplement a School District must pay to a Second Class teacher or to a teacher of the Third Class seems designed as an inducement to country School Districts to engage Third Class teachers and so lower the standard of education in these districts. And whereas, We consider our children, even in the smaller country School Districts are entitled to the same opportunities to receive a fair education as the children of any other section of the Province. Therefore resolved: That we condemn as a retrograde movement in education, 1st, the placing of an equal compulsory supplement on all Districts big or small, rich or poor. 2nd, The payment of a smaller compulsory supplement to a Third Class teacher than to a teacher of the Second Class. Further Resolved: That the Public School Act, 1920 should be amended by repealing: 1st, The section levying compulsory supplements on the School Districts; 2nd, Sec. 43 relating to School Districts with less average attendance than 15. And also resolved: That a copy of these resolutions be sent to the Board of Education and to the press for publication.—James McDonald, Secretary.

SUCCESSFUL ISLANDER RETURNING.—The many friends of Mr. A. K. McNeil, who recently purchased the old Ayward estate at Southport, will be pleased to hear that he hopes to take up his residence there for a time at least in the not too distant future. Mr. McNeil has spent eleven years in the West, where he has proved to be one of our successful islanders. Ten years ago, in 1910, he was in Govan, Sask., where he was very successful in wheat farming, in one year at least, shipping seven thousand bushels of wheat, grown on his own farm. Last autumn he went to Kelliker, where he owns a ranch of over a thousand acres. In the town of Kelliker, he also has, with his partner, Mr. A. E. Robertson, of Regina, opened up a real estate office. Although spending a lot of time in the stocking and looking after his ranch Mr. McNeil has sold about five thousand acres of land, the present season including at least three farms he has sold to former friends from P.E.I., these three being Joseph Duffy, Wilfrid Duffy and Harry Stewart, all from near Charlottetown, who all are said to be well pleased with the country in general and their farms in particular, as by present indications the growing crop should realize nearly half the purchase price of the farms. The ranch owned by Mr. McNeil is said by one of the ranchers from Alberta to be an ideal one, in fact one of the best he has ever visited. His friend congratulated Mr. McNeil on the purchase of this fine property at Southport, so near his old home town, but cannot believe that he will long desert his beloved West.

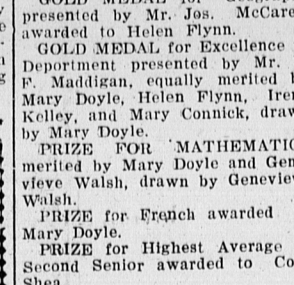

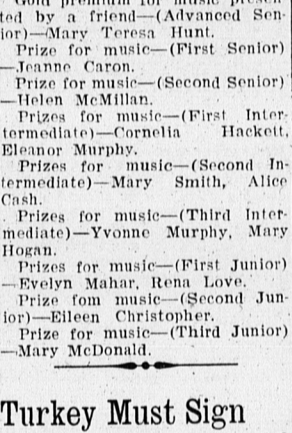
